69' Deer Party Permits To Be Available Soon

Applications for 1969 deer hunting party permits in New York State will be available in late August at all Conservation Department regional offices and license-issuing agencies, the State Conservation Department has announced.
As was the case last year, completed applications may be submitted as soon as they become available, but not later than September 20. No preference will be given to applications submitted early, but no applications will be accepted that are postmarked September 21 or later.
A total of 100,150 permits will be available for 19 specified deer management areas. Last season 73,399 permits were issued in 18 areas and 39,026 deer were taken under these permits. This meant that more than half the parties were successful.
A party — ranging in size from two to four members, depending on the area chosen — may take a deer of either sex in addition to the one antlered deer legally allowed each member of the party as an individual big game hunter.
Each prospective party member must buy his 1969 big game license before he can apply for a party permit. The portion of the big game license designated "Party Permit Stub" must be included with the application. Applications this year are printed on forms with carbon paper interleaved between the parts.
The party will indicate its choice of area on the application. If the number of valid applications for an area is less than the quota, all will be accepted. If the number of applications for an area exceeds the quota, a computer will randomly select enough applications to fill the quota.
Each application submitted must be accompanied by the \$5 Party Permit fee in the form of a certified check, cashier's check or money order payable to "N. Y. S. Conservation Department." Any party not selected for the area they chose will be offered the opportunity to reapply for an under-subscribed area or have their fee refunded. Successful applicants will be issued their validated permit and armband.
A person owning 50 acres or more in one parcel within a deer management area may use the special landowner application, also available at all Conservation Department regional offices and license-issuing outlets, to secure a party permit without going through the computer selection process. Up to 50 percent of the quota in each area is available for qualified landowner parties.
Landowner parties have the same application deadline as regular applications — September 20. Landowner parties will have two members in every area.
Each of the 19 deer management areas operating this season has been assigned a quota of permits based upon biological studies of herd and range conditions. These quotas are designed to produce a deer harvest of such a size as to result in a stable, healthy herd.
Complete information about applications, quotas, party size, management areas and hunting with a party permit are contained on the information sheet which is distributed with each party permit application. Applicants are cautioned to read this sheet carefully and to follow all instructions. They should also check the 1969-70 Hunting and Fishing Guide for additional information about the big game season.
Deer management area boundaries this year are identical for 17 of the areas used last year. One existing area — T — has been enlarged slightly and another — P — has been added.
Quotas and a general description of the 1969 deer management areas follow.

ADIRONDACKS

AREA A — 5,850 permits; 2,925 two-member regular parties and 2,925 two-member landowner parties. Portions of Franklin, Hamilton and Essex Counties.
AREA B — 9,400 permits; 4,700 two-member regular parties and 4,700 two-member landowner parties. Portions of Herkimer, Hamilton, Warren, Saratoga and Fulton Counties, including the Moose River Recreation Area.
AREA C — 10,100 permits; 5,050 two-member regular parties and 5,050 two-member landowner parties. Portions of Franklin, Hamilton, Herkimer, Lewis, Oneida and St. Lawrence Counties.
AREA M — 9,500 permits; 4,750 two-member regular parties and 4,750 two-member landowner parties. Portions of Franklin and St. Lawrence Counties.
AREA N — 1,100 permits; 550 three-member regular parties and 550 two-member landowner parties. Portions of Lewis, Jefferson, Oswego and Oneida Counties.
AREA O — 550 permits; 275 three-member regular parties and 275 two-member landowner parties. Portions of Herkimer and Oneida Counties.
AREA P — 2,200 permits; 1,100 two-member regular parties and 1,100 two-member landowner parties. Portions of Clinton, Essex and Franklin Counties.

CATSKILLS

AREA D — 2,800 permits; 1,400 three-member regular parties and 1,400 two-member landowner parties. Portions of Delaware, Otsego and Schoharie Counties.
AREA E — 19,850 permits; 9,925 two-member regular parties and 9,925 two-member landowner parties. Portions of Orange, Sullivan, Ulster and Delaware Counties.
AREA R — 2,600 permits; 1,300 three-member regular parties and 1,300 two-member landowner parties. Portions of Otsego, Herkimer, Schoharie and Delaware Counties.
AREA S — 1,450 permits; 725 four-member regular parties and 725 two-member landowner parties. Portions of Schoharie, Albany, Greene and Delaware Counties.
AREA T — 3,350 permits; 1,675 four-member regular parties and 1,675 two-member landowner parties. Portions of Sullivan, Ulster, Delaware, Schoharie, and Greene Counties.
AREA W — 3,450 permits; 1,725 three-member regular parties and 1,725 two-member landowner parties. Portions of Columbia, Dutchess and Putnam Counties.

WESTERN NEW YORK

AREA F — 9,000 permits; 4,500 four-member regular parties and 4,500 two-member landowner parties. All of Allegany and Steuben as well as portions of Schuyler and Chemung Counties.
AREA G — 3,800 permits; 1,900 three-member regular parties and 1,900 two-member landowner parties. All of Chautauque and Cattaraugus Counties.
AREA H — 3,300 permits; 1,650 four-member regular parties and 1,650 two-member landowner parties. All of Livingston and Yates, as well as portions of Monroe, Ontario, Genesee and Wyoming Counties.
AREA I — 1,850 permits; 925 four-member regular parties and 925 two-member landowner parties. All of Erie, Niagara, Orleans, Warren and Seneca, as well as portions of Monroe, Ontario, Genesee and Wyoming Counties.
AREA J — 4,200 permits; 2,100 four-member regular parties and 2,100 two-member landowner parties. Portions of Chemung, Schuyler, Tompkins, Tioga, Broome, Chenango and Delaware Counties.
AREA K — 5,800 permits; 2,900 three-member regular parties and 2,900 two-member landowner parties. All of Cortland, as well as portions of Tompkins, Tioga, Broome, Chenango, Madison, Oneida, Onondaga and Cayuga Counties.
