County Clerk Announces Installation Of New Computer System

Allegany County Clerk, Helen S. Ackerman, announced today that her motor vehicle bureau is now a part of the State Department of Motor Vehicles' new computer system for issuing duplicate driver licenses.

The new system, inaugurated by Motor Vehicle Commissioner Vin-cent L. Tofany last year, can pro-duce a replacement license in a matter of seconds. In the near future, the system also will be used to duplicate lost vehicle reg-istration certificates or other mo-tor vehicle documents.

"This system will be of enor-mous assistance to us in providing service to the motorists of our county", Mrs. Ackerman remarked. A device called a computer ter-minal, which is a special type of remote-control typewriter, has been installed in the County Clerk's main office in Belmont.

An operator uses the keyboard to request the duplicate license, after which the computer takes over and prints the license at the rate of 14-plus characters per sec-ond.

Under the former system, the necessary data had to be trans-mitted by mail to the central files in Albany. Sometimes the driver had to wait from one to two weeks for his duplicate license.

Each computer terminal is con-nected directly with the license files in the main computer in Al-bany via telephone lines. After the operator types the necessary data on the computer terminal and activates the machine, the com-puter in Albany "reads" the re-quest, checks its data bank, and then transmits and prints all per-tinent data on a license form.

Should that data indicate that the license is under suspension or revocation, the computer will re-port this instead of completing the form.

Should the computer fail to lo-cate the data because the request does not conform to the infor-mation on the original license, the driver will be nearby to give the terminal operator the needed in-formation.

Mrs. Ackerman said that by the end of the year 263 terminals similar to that installed in her office will have been installed in 93 motor vehicle issuing offices throughout the State. New York is the first state in the nation to use the terminals to process motor vehicle information.
