It is a tragic war against Communism all of us want to win, and none of us want to endure.

But what excuse can we offer for amateur drivers without hate or rangeour alaughtering each

To begin with, if previous Village Administrations down thru the years had used the revenue from the water department for improvement of the water system instead of using it for other purposes to keep the tax rate down to try and re-assure their re-election, the water system wouldn't be in the sad shape that it is!

As it was, only necessary repairs were made — instead of permanent improvements. Don't you recall that when a new Chlorinator had to be purchased, that there wasn't enough money in the Water Department Improvement Fund to buy it with — and so the

Water Department Improvement Fund to buy it with — and so the water rates had to be raised then? Several years have passed — and now we are faced with another similar situation. It has been a known fact for years that the Village Reservoir has needed major repairs — but no plans were formulated to our knowledge to remedy the situation. Instead, emergency repairs were made to stop gency repairs were made to stop a leak here and there — and will, let future Board Members worry about it.

Now, our current administration is faced with the "facts of life" that a planned improvement program is needed to be spread out over a period of time in the future. And, its going to cost all of us some money to do it!

It is desired to hire a professional engineer to come in, see what needs to be done, examine the springs and reservoir — see whether they are adequate, see what needs to be repaired or replaced, determine what water lines need to be replaced and enlarged to comply with deficiencies formatically the Fire Underwriters reports etc.

this hearing to discuss the entire situation.
