Speed Boats Menace Waterways

I've been dodging speed boats and water skiers for as long as anybody else who prefers the more peaceful pastime of trying to fool a fish. And, over the years, I've defended their rights to public waters. But no longer. Overpowered boats teamed with reckless or novice operators have become a menace on New York's waterways. Whether trolling for muskies on Chautauqua Lake or fishing for trout in Lake George, you can not escape hoodlum boaters. You don't realize how great the danger until you've been run down by one, as I was recently. After hitting our boat with a board he was towing, the operator first chewed out his two teen-agers for not jumping off sooner and then told us he didn't see us (three adults in an outboard). He then continued to harass us like a shark worrying a macheral, until we had to quit fishing.

Granted, this is only one accident. But it takes only one if you happen to get in the path of a hot-rod maniac.

It is important to note that this was an Ohio boater, and came from a state where the sport of sooming fishermen is about as popular as watching the Cleveland Browns play a home game. Ohio skiers are so discourteous and dangerous, that the Division of Parks has had to limit them to

zoned areas in certain lakes. Horsepower restrictions have been put on others.

One way around this attempt to put some sanity in Buckeye boating, apparently, is to take your horsepower-heavy rig to another state and try to splash the water out of their lakes.

In addition to the possibility of causing bodily harm, these runabouts with no place to go, pose a more subtle danger. By being big, noisy, fast, and persistent, they take over the water, infringing the rights of other users. This year I've seen sailboats tack to avoid them, and in Ontario a speed boater in repeated attacks drove swimmers from a private beach. Incidents with fishermen are too numerous to mention - I know one who keeps a large spoon with a trebel hook which he claims to use when "fishing" for skiers.

Enforcement of existing laws would be a start in curbing the hoodlum boater. But after spending a considerable amount of time on the water in New York and other states, I've never seen a single act of law enforcement. The water seems to be the last frontier on earth, where a man can do whatever he pleases. And then don his skipper cap and white deck shoes and brag about it at the bar. Fishermen arise!

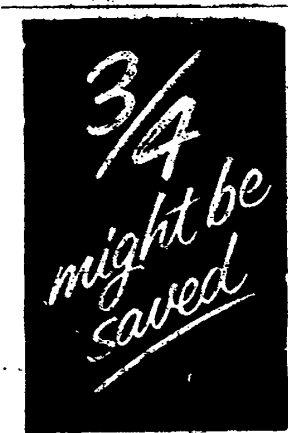
