

**GREENWOOD NEWS**

The Community was shocked Tuesday to learn of the resignation of Robert Hoagland, Supervising Principal at Greenwood Central School the past six years. He tendered his resignation at the regular Board of Education meeting Monday night and plans to leave early in October.

Mr. Hoagland will become the Supervising Principal of Romulus Central School, a district with 960 students in comparison to Greenwood Central having 355. He will direct a staff of 55 teachers and will have three full time administrators. At G.C.S. there are 21 teachers and a part-time Vice-Principal to assist the Supervising Principal. He will replace Frank Rose, a former Physical Education Teacher at Airport Central who has been named Supervising Principal at Warsaw. Besides serving as Supervising Principal for six years at Greenwood, Hoagland was also a Vocational Agriculture Teacher of 13 1/2 years and vice-principal nine of these years.

Mr. Hoagland is a native of Canisteo, where he graduated from high school in 1948 and taught his first year after graduating from Cornell University in 1950. He received his Master's Degree from Alfred University in 1953. He has since taken courses towards a doctorate in educational administration and says he will complete the program at the University of Rochester, while working in Ramulus.

The family is planning to remain in Greenwood until later in the year. Mrs. Hoagland has been taking work at Corning Community College and enrolled Thursday for the Fall Semester. Their sons Robert 12 and Stanley 7 are in school at Greenwood. Mr. and Mrs. Hoagland have been active in community activities. They are members of the local United Methodist Church and Mr. Hoagland is a Lay Speaker. He has been a Volunteer Fireman, the Ambulance Corp, the Sentinel Lodge F. & A. M. and assisted in Scouting. They have both been Church School Teachers and members of the Eastern Star.

Richard York, President of the Board of Education called a special meeting Wednesday night and a second meeting for September 13 to consider applicants for Supervising Principal. The Board met to study qualification requirements and plan procedure for recruiting candidates. Supervising Principal Hoagland, told the Board that applicants must be certified either by having 60 hours of graduate study to their credit, or by having served as a Supervising Principal for three years. The requirements are under a State Law that became effective Sept. 1.

Coach VanHagan and his Soccer Team begin the first game of the season Tuesday, September 23 at Jasper Central. Friday Sept. 26 Trousburg Central comes to Greenwood.

A regular meeting of the Board of Education, of the Greenwood Central School, was held at the office on September 8.

Mr. Hoagland reported briefly to the Board that there had been some damage done to the school hedge as a result of misuse of a motor vehicle. It was reported that Geraldine Lamphier had resigned and Mrs. Mary Mullen was given an appointment to fill this position as school aide.

Transportation routes and problems were discussed and the Board decided to make no changes in the present routing at the present time. Interested persons are requested to indicate their feelings relative to transportation matters, to the Board Members and all transportation routes will be reviewed periodically throughout the year.

Mr. Hoagland was authorized to reserve one room, for the attendance of school officials at the annual School Board's conference to be held Oct. 26 and 27.
