We hope that through him we may be able to understand better the people of South America. Editorial

In Memorial

A man? Yes. But more than just a common man. A Senator? Yes. But different from the ordinary Senator. A Republican? Yes. But also Democrat. A Leader? Yes, in many respects. These were Everett McKinley Dirksen.

Born in Pekin, Illinois, on January 4, 1896, Everett Dirksen was destined to become a great man. He was elected to the House of Representatives in 1932 and he served there for sixteen years. He was elected to the Senate in 1950 and was re-elected in 1956 and 1962. He became Senate minority leader in 1959. While in Congress, Senator Dirksen earned a National reputation as an eloquent speaker and was never at a loss for words. At the peak of his power, he fashioned his talent for oratory, drama and political maneuver into a force which made him one of Washington's most influential figures. Dirksen, he of the tangled mane and the rumbling bass voice, was known as a skilled practitioner of the art of compromise and a key figure in keeping the legislative wheels turning. Although he was a member of the Republican Party he fought conformity and often supported Democratic measures because he believed they were right. He had supported Medicare and federal aid for education, while at the same time he had called the Anti-Poverty Program a "boondoggle" and a "colossal disgrace".

In 1963, Dirksen was on the Senate floor, arguing the case for Kennedy in the struggle over ratification of the limited nuclear test ban treaty. "Take one little step with some hope and some faith," he urged. The Senate did. Later, he said the Johnson administration was pursuing social programs with "the popeyed order of a Harpo Marx chasing blondes".

But when fellow Republicans said he was too close to President Johnson, Dirksen had a standard reply: "Not that I loved Ceasar less, but that I loved Rome more." Senate majority leader Mike Mansfield said he had enjoyed a perfect relationship with his Republican counterpart. "His word was good," Mansfield said. "Everything was on the table."

"If the day ever comes," Dirksen had said, "when, under pressure, or as a result of picketing or other devices, I should be pushed from the rock where I must stand to render an independent judgment, my justification in public life will have come to an end."

Everything about Senator Everett Dirksen added to his image. His face, florid and lumpy, could be sad, pixieishly, melodramatic or startled — whatever punctuation his speech at the time demanded. And always there was the hair — wispy, white, always looking as if he had just stepped from a speedy convertible.

"If you have some kind of trademark like unruly hair, people get to recognize you," he had said. And recognized he was whenever he spoke. "I think I would die unhappy unless I made some contribution to putting America, and particularly young America, back into the stream of tradition." Thank you, Senator Dirksen.
