### Horsemen's Asso. Plan 100 Mile Trail Ride

Nearly 150 participants have registered with the Empire State Horsemen's Association for a three-day 100 mile pleasure trail ride over the N.Y.S. Conservation Department's Brookfield Horse Trail System in Madison County Sept. 26, 27, and 28.

Headquarters and assembly area has been established by the Conservation Department at the old Moscow Hill C.C.C. camp location. Stabling facilities for most of the horses are available at the Brookfield Fairground about two miles from the assembly area.

Maintenance of the Brookfield Horse Trails and coordination of arrangements for the trail ride for the Conservation Department are under the supervision of William Craig, District Director of Forest District 2, Division of Lands and Forests, Sherburne, N. Y.

Assisting in the trail ride with escort and other duties are volunteer members of the New York State County Sheriff's Mounted Patrols.

Food will be available at the headquarters and on the trails through local church and civic organizations at minimal cost. Parking for cars, trailers and campers will be available at the assembly area, at the Brookfield Fairgrounds, and within the trail ride area.

Objectives of the three-day af-

fair are to acquaint the participants with the beautiful land made available to equestrians thru trails marked and maintained especially for their use, to stimulate interest in trail riding, to encourage good horsemanship, and to demonstrate the results of proper training and conditioning of horses for trail use.

One of several similar facilities developed for public use by the Conservation Department, the Brookfield Horse Trail System lies mostly on State Reforestation Lands purchased under the Hewitt Act of 1931. The Brookfield System along with others some located in the Catskill and Adirondack Forest Preserves, is described in a brochure entitled "Horse Trails in New York State" available free from the Bureau of Forest Recreation, N.Y.S. Conservation Department, Albany, N. Y. 12226.
