ACS Immunization Clinics

Oct. 21, Nov. 18, and Dec. 16

Public Health Law, section 2164 requires all children entering school to be immunized against smallpox, measles and poliomyelitis. The Allegany Co. Health Dept., in cooperation with the Board of Education is sponsoring 3 immunization clinics at ACS under the direction of Dr. A. Folsom.

Children age 3 mos. thru 5 years may be protected against Diphtheria, Pertussis (Whooping Cough) and tetanus (Lockjaw) (DPT). Children over age 5 years receive just Diphtheria and Tetanus (DT). Immunization against polio is available in oral form (Sabin) and in injection form (Salk). Children from 1 year on may be protected against Smallpox. Children age 1 year to 7 years may receive measles vaccine.

Parents wishing their pre-school children to be immunized in clinic must call the School Nurse-Teacher and make arrangements for the vaccine to be ordered. School age children will receive notices stating they are due for boosters. Boosters are recommended every 5 years.

PRECAUTIONS: Children with eczema should not be vaccinated against smallpox. Brothers and sisters of a child with eczema should not be vaccinated against smallpox in order to protect the child with eczema.

Children who are allergic to eggs or any poultry products should not receive measles vaccine. Children with a sensitivity to streptomycin or neomycin should not receive measles vaccine. Vaccination should be delayed if gamma globulin has been administered within the last six weeks. Children receiving measles vaccine may develop a low grade fever in ten days. It is usually not serious and requires no special care.

It is going to be looked into to see if the Conservation Department will make the necessary repairs and, if they don't, then the Town of Andover will see that it is taken care of. Only please Folks - don't wait too long. We have several local residents that are worried that the dam will go out if we get a lot of rain this fall - and, come to think of it - that really would dampen more than a fellow's spirits at that, wouldn't it?

College Scholarships Offered By U.S. Army

(Fort Meade, Md.) - College scholarships for 1200 outstanding high school seniors who are motivated toward an Army career will be offered again this year, the U. S. Army has announced.

The scholarships, good at any of the 274 colleges and universities in the United States offering the four-year Army ROTC program, have been awarded annually on a competitive basis for the past five years.

Scholarship winners receive their full tuition, textbook costs and laboratory fees, plus a \$50 per month allowance for the full four years.

Winners may select academic courses in the field of their choice, the only additional requirement being the completion of officer training subjects. Upon graduation, they are commissioned second lieutenants in the Army and fulfill their military obligation by serving four years on active duty.

Student selection is based on academic excellence, extracurricular activities, physical standards, results of college entrance examination boards, personal qualities and leadership potential.

Since part of the scholarship selection is based on the College Entrance Examination Board (CEEB) Tests, it is essential that high school students who intend to compete for one of these awards take the tests this fall.

High school seniors, their parents or teachers may obtain information by writing: ROTC Scholarships, First U.S. Army, Fort Meade, Maryland 20755. Deadline for submission of completed applications is January 15, 1970. Announcement of scholarship winners will be made in the Spring of 1970.
