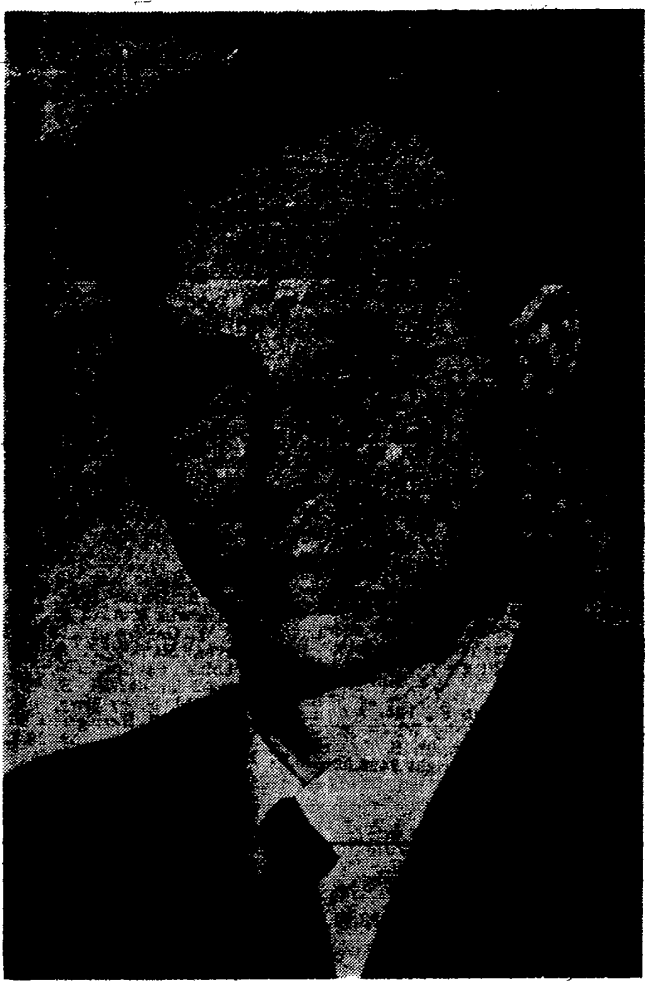

Charles W. Hebblethwaite Receives Distinguished Service Award


Charles W. Hebblethwaite, Allegany County agricultural agent for the past 20 years, received the Distinguished Service Award from the National Association of County Agricultural Agents Thursday night, September 25. Meeting in 54th Annual session at Atlantic City, New Jersey, the association cited Hebblethwaite for the outstanding ability and leadership he has demonstrated in organizing Extension programs. The agent has had a continuing program with the beef cattlemen in Allegany County. His efforts as secretary of the Regional Pike Feeder Calf Sale since 1955 have done much to promote the growth of this sale and improve the quality of the cattle consigned. Today it has become the largest of its type in New York State. In

recognition of his contributions to the sale and his leadership in the beef industry, Hebblethwaite was honored by the New York State Beef Cattlemen's Association in 1968.

The citation also called him a key person in the establishment of the first regional community resource development program in New York State.

Other areas in which his leadership was noted include improved hunter relations, farm management, agricultural engineering and joint programs of agricultural educational and service agencies in Allegany County.
