Wellsville To Receive Increase In Amount Of Firm Power

The Village of Wellsville, in Allegany County, New York, has been granted an increase in the amount of firm power committed by the Power Authority of the State of New York. The increase raises the contract demand from 7,500 kilowatts to 10,000 kilowatts.

The village first began to receive electricity from the Niagara Power Project in May, 1961, and immediately reduced the electric bills of its residential and commercial customers by an average of 13.5 per cent.

Ever since, the Village system has continued to grow. In November 1966, the original contract demand of 6,000 kilowatts was increased to 7,500 kilowatts. A major factor has been continued expansion of the village's largest industrial customer. Worthington Turbine Company. The new increase will enable Wellsville to meet projected further additions to Worthington's requirements.

The Power Authority supplies wholesale power from St. Lawrence and Niagara Power Projects to 41 municipal and cooperative retail electric systems in New York State. In the last 12 months the peak loads of these customers have risen by nearly 20 per cent over the previous year.

Approval of the Authority trustees of the increased allocation of power is in accordance with the announced intention of the Power Authority to meet the needs of its municipal and rural cooperative customers as they arise.

Hearing To Consider Indemnities In Event Of Cholera Outbreak

Public hearings on proposed laws to indemnify owners of swine slaughtered in efforts to eradicate hog cholera and to eliminate garbage feeding of swine, will be conducted at the State Fair grounds in Syracuse on October 13.

Senator Theodore D. Day, R, of Interlaken, chairman of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Marketing, will preside at the hearings in the Administration Building on the fairgrounds.

The morning hearing, at 10:30, will consider a bill to pay for swine killed as a protective measure when at least one animal in the herd develops positively identified hog cholera. Laboratory confirmations would be determining factor if a suspected outbreak of the disease occurs.

The afternoon session, at 1:30 will concern a bill outlawing the feeding of garbage to swine.

Until Sept. 15, there were 1,021 outbreaks of cholera in the United States this year, according to officials of the Cooperative State-Federal Hog Cholera Eradication program. Confirmed outbreaks in July numbered 231, and 168 more occurred in August. Comparative figures for those months in 1968 were 52 and 67. High outbreak states in August were Texas, North Carolina, Missouri, Arkansas, South Carolina, Louisiana and Illinois.

Senator Day said members of the Assembly Committee on Agriculture have been invited to attend the hearings in Syracuse October 13.

For Reforestation Projects Contact Local Area Board

Earl Austin of Kanona, N. Y., and Eddy Foster of Alfred, N. Y. are attending the three-day Fall Meeting of the New York State Forest Practice Board being held this week near Freehold, N. Y. They represent the District Board of Forest District 4, which embraces ten counties.

This advisory group of laymen from the State's fourteen Forest Districts meet twice annually with Conservation Department personnel to discuss the problems of forest management on private woodlands, and to make recommendations and take action toward improving the forest resources and the forest-based economy of the State.

"Forest Taxation" has been chosen as the theme of the meeting. A detailed study is being made of this subject, to print up present inequities in taxation and assessment methods, and to look for ways of overcoming these difficulties. A series of talks is being presented by a panel of experts.

Landowners desiring the advice of a Conservation Department forester on the management of their woodlands or on a reforestation project, may contact either Mr. Austin or Mr. Foster, or District Director Charles B. Kregge of the New York State Conservation Department at 115 Liberty St., Savings & Loan Bldg., Bath, N. Y., for such information, or on the advantages of becoming a cooperator under the Forest Practice Act.
