Northern Zone **Party Permits** Extended 4 Days

Deer nunters in New York State per nunters in New 10rk State got some good news today from the Conservation Department. There will be an additional four-day filing period for party per-mits in the Northern Zone (Adiron dacks). This unusual step is being taken, according to a Division of Fish and Wildlife spokesman, in order to allow filling of all party

order to allow filling of all party permit quotas.

The Department had announced last week that party permit applicants who were not selected by computer would be given an opportunity to reapply for one the party permit areas which was undersubscribed. These parties will have first choice at the unfilled quotas and their amended party permit applicants must be postmarked no earlier than October 14 and no later than October 17. Details of the procedure for reapplication were mailed to those reapplication were mailed to those parties eligible to reapply.

Other hunters who either Other hunters who either did not submit a party permit applica-tion or whose applications were returned because they failed to meet the original September 20 postmark deadline date, may now apply for a two-member party permit for one of five Adirondack areas still open. The quota shown is what remained after the orig-inal party permit filing period ended.

ended.

The areas to be opened to the general public are as follows:

Area A, -- portions of Essex, Franklin and Hamilton Counties—1,730 permits.

Area B. — portions of Fulton Hamilton, Herkimer, Saratoga and Warren Counties, including the Moose River Area -- 1,596 permits

Area C. portions of Franklin Hamilton, Herkimer, Lewis, One ida and St. Lawrence Counties 3,895 permits.

Area M. portions of Frank lin and St. Lascrence Counties 4,006 permits. Area P. portion of China.

Area P, parties of characteristics and P, plications is the same as it is for the original filing a raity parties which come with the big game license, must be submitted for both members of the party along with a completed application form (available at all regional Fish and Wildlife offices as well as at many license-issuing agencies). The party permits fee of \$5 may be submitted in the form of cash, check or money order. Unsuccessful applicants will receive refund.

Parties that were notified that their application was not selected by the computer for their original area-choice may reapply for one of the Adirondack areas either in the original party size or in smaller two-man parties. If their original party is split up into two-man parties, they must submit another \$5 fee to pay for the second party.

Remember the required postmark dates. For those parties not selected by computer: no earlier than October 17. For the general public: no earlier than October 21, Party permits will be assigned on the basis of the earliest postmark within these periods, so it is advised to make application as soon as possible during the eligible period. This early submission should also make it possible for party leaders to receive the permits in time for the October 25 season opening. time for opening.
