The frustration of anti-Goedell Republicans has been something like a man blowing air into a tattered balloon.

Now Republican State Senator Edward Speno of East Meadow, L. I., has come along and patched it up by declaring he is an official candidate for the U.S. Senate seat now held by Charles E. Goodell.

The only surprising thing about the announcement was that it came so soon, with the June, 1970 primaries a good nine months away.

A lot can happen — and will — in nine months.

Goodell, said Speno, "has never been tested for acceptance by the voters on a statewide basis and has never been tested before the state committee of the Republican party."

Well, about half of that statement is true. Goodell has yet to run in an election statewide.

But Goodell did win the acceptance of the Republican state committee over a year ago when Governor Rockefeller named him to replace the late Robert F. Kennedy.

It would be unwise for anyone to suggest that on these, and most other matters, the state committee is something more than a rubber stamp for the governor, who is the leader of the "in" party in Albany.

But the problem is that the rubber stamps thought they were approving a "conservative" appointment, someone whose name on the statewide ballot could help them in local elections. These

rubber stamps are also strong believers in party unity. They may grumble, but they do what the leader says.

On both counts Goodell has turned sour in their mouths.

Goodell does not sit patiently at the heels of either Rockefeller or President Nixon, and since his appointment he has traded in his conservative image as a congressman from Jacksonville for a liberal image who knows he has to win in New York City if he wants to hold onto his seat next year.

Upstate Republicans may forgive a man for being a liberal, but not for refusing to obey the commands of his leader. U.S. Senator Jacob K. Javits is the perfect example of that principle of Republican state politics. Javits is a liberal but no one is making him around. He even, it will be remembered, ran with the Liberal Party endorsement in 1966.

Speno said he considers himself a "viable alternative to the present incumbent."

Not, we suggest, until he spends a lot of money spreading his picture among the voters of New York City.

Upstate Speno is a different matter. He campaigned hard for the appointment a year ago and lost to Goodell. More importantly, he has been campaigning among the leaders ever since.

But even a better known possible candidate is the secretary of state, John P. Lomenzo.

In the end, the governor himself will have the final say about the Goodell matter.
