North To Autumn
By the time you read this, I will have traveled north to meet autumn head-on with flights of ducks and geese in the air, and the brook trout brilliant with spawning colors. My son and I are taking a dream trip to Povungnituk, high up on the east side of Hudson Bay in Quebec's wilderness. New York for all of its pollution and other environmental problems, remains a top state for the sportsman. Few others, and certainly none in the East, can offer the variety of Long Island Sound and the Ocean, Adirondack Mountains, Finger Lakes, Great Lakes and all the other outdoor opportunities in between. But, perhaps, best of all, New York has a friendly neighbor to the North where millions of us go at least once a year for spectacular fishing, hunting, and outdoor adventure. This year Tommy and I are going to Povungnituk, an Eskimo village, to see for ourselves how arctic char compare with muskies, and to try for really trophy brook trout. We're changing our gear for the brook trout. Instead of delicate wands to take natives in up-state tributaries, we will use spinning rods with real backbone for possible six pounders. In addition to char and brook trout, we'll be ready for huge lake trout, and pike, and possibly landlocked salmon. The waterfowl and game bird season will come in while we are there, and for this reason we chose late summer for our trek to Povungnituk. Fishing will be our main interest, but for no extra cost we will get a crack at flights like our grandfathers used to see. The Canadian Government Travel Bureau office in Rochester, New York and the Province of Quebec recommended a fall vacation for the ultimate in outdoor sport for the least cost. In addition, we'll enjoy the warm and sincere friendship of the Eskimos, probably the best hunters and fishermen on the earth. A bonus week of autumn, sensational fishing and hunting, and memories for a lifetime isn't bad for only one Canadian vacation.
