George W. Barrett of West Northrup Pl., Buffalo, died Thursday, October 16, 1969 after a long illness.

Born August 12, 1883 in Andover, he was a son of the late Patrick and Mary Wholhen Barrett. Mr. Barrett was a retired dairy farmer and owned and operated a milk route in Andover for many years.

On Jan. 12, 1908 he was united in marriage to Cora Corwin Barrett who preceded him in death in August 1942.

He is survived by a daughter, Miss Edna Barrett of Buffalo, two grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren, several nieces and nephews. A son, Gilbert J. Barrett died in 1951.

A prayer service was held Monday at 9:30 a. m., at the James B. Mulholland Funeral Home, Church St., Andover, followed by a Requiem Mass at the Blessed Sacrament Church at 10 a. m. with Rev. John R. Shea celebrant.

Burial was in Hillside Cemetery, Andover.

Andover Fire Department Buys New Pumper

The truck committee composed of President Merle Fox, William Woodruff, Richard Schrader, Second Assistant Chief Ronald Glover, Chief Ken Vars, who was unable to go because of business reasons, went to Elmira on Saturday, October 18, to pick up a new truck which is a Ward LaFrance 1000 gallons per minute pumper mounted on a Ford chassis.

By recommendation of the underwriters it was suggested that a pumper with a 100 gal. capacity be purchased to replace the 1941 International. This brings our pumping capacity up to 1750 gal., which is what the underwriters recommend for a community this size.

The new truck has many modern features, one of which is a 1500 Watt A.C. light outfit, which includes two Circle D lights. These lights can be used inside a building at a fire or outside as flood lights. In addition, there is the usual equipment which includes fire extinguishers, axes, pike poles, self contained breathing apparatus and hand lanterns.

The truck is equipped with a 750 gal. water tank which is 250 gallons larger than the one on the truck purchased in 1963. Purchased along with the truck were additional hats, coats, and boots, a new portable pump, and a supply of new hose which was badly needed.

This new pumper puts the Andover Fire Department in a much better position to meet the needs of the community for fire protection and this equipment is something that must be kept modern and capable of doing the job it is intended to do.

An Open House will be held in the near future so the public may see the new fire truck. The date will be announced later.
