NOW THEREFORE, notice is hereby given that, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by law, I shall on the 28th day of November, 1969, at 1:00 o'clock P. M., at the Court House in the Town of Amity, commence selling at public auction, so much of each of the said several and respective lots, tracts, pieces or parcels of land as shall be sufficient to pay all State, County, Highway, School, or other taxes assessed and levied thereon in the year 1968, that may then remain due on each thereof, respectively together with the interest, cost and charges which have arisen or accrued or that may arise or accrue thereon, and shall sell and continue from day to day to sell until the said sale shall be completed.

The purchasers at such sale shall pay the amount of their respective bids to the County Treasurer within forty-eight hours after the last day of the sale and receive certificates describing the land purchased, the sums paid, and the time when the purchasers will be entitled to deeds; subject to the Soldiers and Sailors Civil Relief Act of 1918 and 1940 and the amendments thereto, and after expiration of one year from the last day of such sale, they shall be entitled to receive conveyances of the lands so purchased by them respectively, (or at their option foreclose the lien as provided by law) unless said lands shall have been previously redeemed, pursuant to law. Allegany County reserves the right to bid in any or all parcels.

Cyclamate — Killer!

This past week-end, it was announced by our national government that a drug widely used by the American populace was found to be a cause of cancer in laboratory animals. The chemical, an artificial sweetener, is found in several different forms, one of which is sodium cyclamate. The formula for sodium cyclamate consists of: carbon, a common element found in carbon dioxide, the gas which plants must have for survival; hydrogen, one of the two elements which combine to form water, a necessity for all living organisms; nitrogen, the element which makes up approximately four-fifth of the air we breathe; oxygen, making up the other fifth of air and sodium, an element found in common table salt.

All of these elements are necessary for the survival of man and yet, put them all together and you have a chemical which has been found to be one of the causes of the most dreaded disease of the modern world. Even with all the scientific and medicinal advancements that the twentieth century man has made, he has not found a cure for cancer. This fatal disease may be the most perplexing problem of the century. It threatens the lives of our loved ones and it is not prejudiced as to whom it strikes. It could be anyone, adults and even teenagers. This disease can cause more pain and sorrow than any war because it strikes not only the fighting men or the soldiers, but the mothers and children of happy homes. So, why wasn't the chemical cyclamate thoroughly researched before it was allowed to be put into the nation's food supplies? It should have been thoroughly checked out and all possible results determined or prevented. It's too late, now though, and the only thing that can be done is the exact action which was proposed and instituted by Secretary of Health, Education and welfare, Mr. Finch.

The various food and beverage companies involved in this seem to be very cooperative. One of the heads of the Pepsi Co., stated that his company will begin to make Diet Pepsi with a small amount of sugar, rather than cyclamate which was a sugar substitute. John M. Joyce, Jr., chairman of the Seven-Up Bottling Company, in New York and his firm would have a substitute within a week but he disagreed with the ban since there is no evidence that cyclamate can hurt human beings.

It is my belief that our federal government acted wisely on this matter and has successfully eliminated any remote chance that a human being may die from a cancer which might have been caused by cyclamate.

The Red Cross is an international movement that seeks to lessen and prevent human suffering by offering communities and nations practical service programs. Its goal is to enlist all mankind in voluntary service to others. It has an estimated membership of 100,000,000 around the world. The American National Red Cross is a private and voluntary service organization. It is financed by voluntary contributions of people throughout America. It is membership organization, seeking to enroll in service to others every adult American citizen and, through Junior Red Cross in the schools, every student in public, private and parochial schools.

The American Red Cross has specific duties such as: to provide services and assistance to members of the Armed Forces, to conduct a disaster preparedness and relief program, and to provide other governmental requested assistance in carrying out the terms of the Geneva conventions.

The organization operates thru more than 3,700 chapters throughout the United States and its possessions. Two-fifth of these chapters are staffed completely by volunteers.

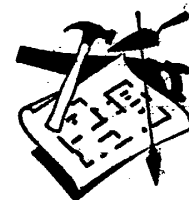
