Contracts Awarded To Area Firms

Governor Rockefeller has announced the award of a contract for \$1,026,411.40 to the Hornell Construction Corp., of Hornell, New York for reconstruction of 0.7-mile of Route 17 in the Village of Wellsville, Allegany County.

The firm submitted the only bid the State Department of Trons

The firm submitted the only bid to the State Department of Transportation. The State's share of the cost of the project will be paid with funds from the Transportation Bond Issue approved by New York voters in 1967.

Twin 24-foot-wide concrete payements separated by a four-foot-wide flush median will be built from Main Street about 200 feet north of Hanover Street-easterly on new alignment, joining the alignment of Dyke Street about 200 feet east of Beckenridge Ave. and ending at the Erie-Lackawanna Railroad overpass. The project includes demolition of buildings for future reconstruction of seabling Bouter Transit Bonney Company Company Control of Company Compan ings for future reconstruction of combined Routes 17 and 19 on new

alignment west of Main Street.
Scheduled for completion by
December 30, 1970, all work will
be under the supervision of the State Department of Transporta-tion District Office at Hornell.

A. L. Blades & Sons, Inc., of Hornell have been awarded a \$162,000 contract covering sitework to be performed at the State University Agricultural and Technical College at Alfred, Governor Rockefeller announced.

Site mechanical work will be performed by Barstow, Inc., of Horseheads, Subcontractor.

As planned by Duryea and Wlihelmi of Syracuse, the project is scheduled for completion by December 1, 1969. It consists of applying a surface course on the existing paving base of the Loop Road, and on certain paving base areas which, under the contract will also require reconstruction. Installation of additional sanitar gas and high temperature hot water lines is also included.

Current construction in progress on the campus at Alfred amounts, to \$10.3 million, which is part of the multibillion dollar physical development program directed by the State University Construction Fund, headed by Dr. Anthony G. Addinolfi, general manager. This public benefit corporation was established in 1962 by the Legislature upon the recommendation of Governor Rockefeller to expedite the construction of facilities to meet the State University's Master Plan requirements.
