STATE OF NEW YORK DEPARTMENT OF STATE

Albany, September 30, 1969 Pursuant to the provisions of section seventy-two of the Election Law, the following Proposed Amendments to the State Constitution Numbers One to Four, inclusive, will be submitted to the voters of the State for approval or disapproval, at the General Election on November fourth, nineteen hundred sixty-nine.

Abstract of Proposed Amendment Number One

The purpose and effect of this proposed amendment is to provide that the Legislature may authorize the State, a municipality or a public corporation acting as an instrumentality of the State or municipality to loan its money or credit to corporations or associations, regulated by law as to their charges, profits, dividends and disposition of their property or franchises for the purpose of providing hospital or other facilities for the prevention, diagnosis or treatment of human disease, pain, injury, disability, deformity or physical condition, and for facilities incidental or appurtenant thereto as may be prescribed by law. The proposed amendment would insert a new section seven in Article seventeen of the Constitution.

Form of Submission of Proposed Amendment Number One Loans for Hospitals and Related Facilities

Shall the proposed amendment to Article seventeen of the Constitution inserting a new Section seven therein, to provide for the loan of the money or credit of the State, a municipality or a public corporation acting as an instrumentality of the State or municipality to certain corporations or associations for the purpose of providing hospital or other facilities for the prevention, diagnosis or treatment of human disease, pain, injury, disability, deformity or physical condition, and for facilities incidental or appurtenant thereto as may be prescribed by law, be approved?

Abstract of Proposed Amendment Number Two

The purpose and effect of this proposed amendment is to enable the Legislature to expand the loan capacity of the Job Development Authority by increasing the aggregate principal amount of the liability of the State as guarantor for the payment of the principal and interest on bonds of such public corporation from \$50,000,000 to \$150,000,000, excluding bonds issued to refund outstanding bonds. This proposed amendment would also permit maturity dates of bond anticipation notes to be extended to the date of the Job Development Authority within seven years instead of five, as at present. The Job Development Authority was created pursuant to and for the purposes specified in Article seven, Section eight of the Constitution which provides for the organization of a public corporation for the purpose of making loans to non-profit corporations to finance the construction of new industrial or manufacturing plants in this State or the acquisition, rehabilitation or improvement of former industrial or manufacturing plants in this State to improve employment opportunities in any area of the State. The amendment would renumber Section seven (relating to such public corporation) in Article ten of the Constitution to be Section eight.

Form of Submission of Proposed Amendment Number Two Job Development Authority

Shall the proposed amendment to Article ten, Section seven (renumbered eight) of the Constitution, increasing from \$50,000,000 to \$150,000,000 the maximum aggregate principal amount for which the Legislature may make the State liable as guarantor at any one time for bonds (exclusive of bonds issued to refund outstanding bonds) issued by a public corporation (Job Development Authority) created for the purpose of making loans to non-profit corporations to finance the construction of new industrial or manufacturing plants in this State or the acquisition, rehabilitation

or improvement of former industrial or manufacturing plants in this State to improve employment opportunities in any area of the State, and providing that bond anticipation notes and any renewals thereof issued by any such public corporation shall mature within seven years after the respective dates of such notes rather than five years after such dates, be approved?

Abstract of Proposed Amendment Number Three

The purpose and effect of this proposed amendment is to set forth the policy of the State to conserve and protect its natural resources and scenic beauty and encourage the development and improvement of its agricultural lands. In implementing such policy the Legislature shall provide for the abatement of air and water pollution, excessive and unnecessary noise, the protection of agricultural lands, wetlands and shorelines, the development and regulation of water resources, and for the acquisition of lands and waters, including improvements thereon and any interest therein outside the forest preserve counties, and for the dedication of properties so acquired or now owned which because of their natural beauty, wilderness character or geological, ecological or historical significance shall be preserved and administered for the use and enjoyment of the people. Such properties are to constitute the State Nature and Historical Preserve, and provision is made that they shall not be taken or otherwise disposed of except by law enacted by two successive regular sessions of the Legislature. The amendment would insert a new Section four in Article fourteen of the Constitution; existing Section four would be renumbered to be Section five.

Form of Submission of Proposed Amendment Number Three Conservation, The State Nature and Historical Preserve

Shall the proposed amendment renumbering Section four of Article fourteen to be Section five and inserting therein a new Section four declaring the policy of the State to conserve and protect its natural resources and scenic beauty and to encourage the development and improvement of its agricultural lands, providing that the Legislature in implementing such policy shall include adequate provision for the abatement of air and water pollution and of excessive and unnecessary noise, the protection of agricultural lands, wetlands and shorelines and the development and regulation of water resources, and providing for the establishment of the State Nature and Historical Preserve outside of the forest preserve counties, and regulating the disposition of the lands thereof, be approved?

Abstract of Proposed Amendment Number Four

The purpose and effect of this proposed amendment is to provide that, for the purpose of apportioning Senate and Assembly districts pursuant to the provisions of Article three, "aliens" would be counted in the population base. The amendment would insert a new section in Article three of the Constitution, to be Section five-a.

Form of Submission of Proposed Amendment Number Four Apportionment

Shall the proposed amendment to Article three of the Constitution, inserting a new Section five-a therein, to provide that, for the purpose of apportioning Senate and Assembly districts pursuant to the provisions of Article three which precede the new section, the term "inhabitants, excluding aliens" shall mean the whole number of persons, be approved?
