

## Town Of Andover Candidate Loses Legislator Bid

Leonard Briggs, Town of Andover Supervisor, lost out on his bid to represent the Town of Andover and the 5th District by a narrow margin in Tuesday's Election.

As a result of the election, the Town of Andover, and the Town of Alfred, two of the largest in the 5th District, will have no direct representation as they have had in the past. Instead, they will be represented by the three elected Legislators, Robert McNinch (R), from Belmont; Lee Ryan, (D), from Almond; and Leonard Watson, (R), from West Almond.
