**Trailer Park Cited By State Health Department**

Ryan's Trailer Park in the Town of Rushford, Allegany County has been ordered by the State Health Department to operate in strict compliance with the State Sanitary Code or pay penalties of \$450 for past violations. Dr. Hollis S. Burrahman, state health commissioner, has announced.

The park is operated by Floyd W. Ryan of Nunda, Livingston County.

The order is based on the findings of a public hearing which upheld the Department's charges that the park was operated without a permit, that it had an inadequate sewage disposal system and that no sewage system plans had been filed. Civil penalties totaling \$540 were imposed but execution was suspended on condition the park is henceforth operated in accordance with the Code.
