There's A Tinkertoy Scholarship For Young Designers!

This is the fifth year that young Tinkertoy designers are being given an opportunity to turn their original toy models into a \$1,000 Scholarship award and an expense paid trip.

Now, all boys and girls in this immediate vicinity and throughout the United States are eligible to participate in Toy Tinker's Scholarship Award Program.

Youngsters may submit sketches or photographs of original models which they have designed from Tinkertoy, Tinker Zoo, Toy Maker or any combination of the three toys before December 31 to qualify for Junior Engineer Certificates of Award and then for the Scholarship Award Program. Judging is on the basis of imaginative-ness and creativity of design.

As in previous years, each of the 50 state finalists receive a handsome mounted, personally-engraved wall plaque. Now holding the title of New York State Finalist is Becky Wright of East Main Street, Yaphank.

The Scholarship Award is a \$1,000 savings bond and an expense paid trip to New York City for the top designer and his or her parents. With this award goes the title of Toy Tinker of the Year also held by ten-year-old Becky Wright, who received the \$1,000 bond from Julie Nixon Eisenhower at the White House.

R. A. Christofferson, president of Toy Tinkers, says "The Scholarship Award Program, now in its fifth year, is in keeping with our line of creative and fun toys." He adds: "Each year, the amount of enthusiasm and the number of participants in this creative awards program continues to be beyond all expectations."

ROTC Scholarship Available For High School Seniors

(Fort Meade, Md.) — too late to apply for ROTC four-year college ship. Deadline for send application is January. Winners will be announced Spring of 1970.

Young men who are high school seniors and motivated to Army career are eligible for one of the 1200 slots. The scholarship may be any of the 277 colleges and universities in the United States offering the four-year Army program.

Scholarship winners receive full tuition, textbook, laboratory fees, plus a month allowance for the year. Winners may select elective courses in the field of choice — the only additional requirement being the completion of training subject graduation, they are commissioned second lieutenants in the Army and fulfill their military duty.
