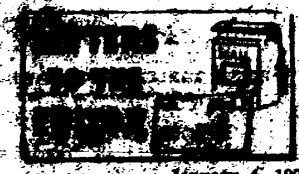
## YMCA Announces Swim Instruction Course

## News That's Print To Fit

Say dear TV viewers! How many of you members of the "3-Way Cable System" received letters stating "You will be receiving 11 Channels of Cable TV Variety" ETC. and further on: "As you are presently a subscriber to the 'Three Way System' there will be NO installation charge?" Then, in another paragraph, it stated: "After your initial trial period your monthly service rate will be \$5.00."

Now didn't that strike you as being a wee bit ambiguous? And, if it sounded misleading to us — how might it be interpreted by other people on the "3-Way Cable System?" We know that the "3-Way Cable System" isn't about to be hooked up to the Allegany Video, Inc., and so we won't be getting 11 Channels — and we won't be paying \$5.50 per month! In fact, as we recall, we are paying \$3 less a month and are still getting 3-NBC Channels; 3-ABC Channels; and 1-CBS Channel. And, since we can only watch 1 Channel at a time, we are satisfied with the reception on all of these that we tune in on.

Yep, when it comes to viewing the promise of "11 crisp and clear Channels" — well, so far we haven't seen all of that! Another thing we are wondering about — can the Time Weather FM be considered a true Channel — when all you see is a few dials — with no action? Let's see now — didn't we once listen to a lot of promises about how much better service we would get with the dial system telephone? One thing we know we got — a phone bill around three times what it used to be! And, as far as service, when you let the thing ring for 15 or 20 times and still can't get the operator — is that better? Then, to add insult to injury, have people tell you that they have been trying to get you all day and the phone was busy — when it hasn't rung in at all — more promises?

Now that a New Year has started we think that it would be appropriate to publish a few warnings that we have received or heard about.

According to a release from the State Consumer Protection Board an item used by thousands of children, women, and even men may cause irritation, swelling and lower urinary tract infections. The warning was issued by Betty Furness, Board Chairwoman, with respect to bubble bath and other detergent-based bath products. Young girls, she said, are particularly susceptible but young boys and women can be affected.

"Pediatricians, gynecologists and urologists report conditions clear up promptly as soon as patients suspend using these products."

Another item that has caused a great deal of trouble for several people that we have heard about is colored toilet paper. Two people, both women, have had serious infections with one of them almost dying and, according to their doctors, their infections were caused from dye in colored toilet paper.

Another warning has been issued by the N. Y. State Department of Health about the danger of burning charcoal briquettes indoors.

Dr. H. S. Ingraham, State Health Commissioner said: "Charcoal briquettes are safe to use outdoors but inside, where there is comparatively limited ventilation, the carbon monoxide gas released by burning charcoal is extremely dangerous and can result in carbon monoxide poisoning or even death."

Persons exposed to carbon monoxide fumes for prolonged periods may experience headaches, dizziness, weakness, mental depression, irritability, circulatory impairment or even death. The gas is invisible, odorless and tasteless.

ed, here is an item named — "CHANGE OF HEART" that should be of vital interest

Two years ago Congress passed a stringent gun control bill — stringent at least so far as law-abiding gun owners were concerned. As opponents of the bill pointed out at the time of its passage, restricting the fundamental right of gun ownership by all private citizens would do little to curb crime. Their prophecies have been borne out.

Now congressional sentiment is increasing for repeal or modification of the 1968 Federal Gun Control Act. Typical of the attitude of a growing number of congressmen and senators is that a Senator William Proxmire of Wisconsin. Senator Proxmire, one of those who voted for the 1968 measure observes, "I would certainly vote for its repeal now. After more than a year and a half of experience with this bill, I have become convinced that it is not a practical anti-crime measure. I would most emphatically support replacement of the act with some more practical and workable anti-crime measure with emphasis on punishing those who misuse firearms more severely, especially when they engage in criminal action."

A survey of congressional members shows that more than a third of the Senate and a quarter of the House were by late 1970 on record in some way as favoring relaxation of the federal gun law. Correction of this piece of legislative folly "take time."

In any event, it is an illustration of how easily our liberties can be infringed upon and how difficult it is to retrace the path toward freedom.

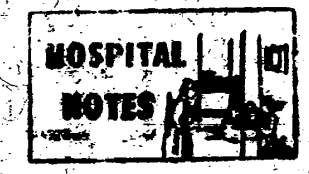
And in this case, we can truthfully say: "we told you so" as this has been our opinion and stand right along!
