As opponents, of the bill pointed out at the time of its passage, restricting the fundamen-tal right of gun ownership by all private citizens would do little to curb crime. Their prophesies have been borne out.

Now congressional sentiment is increasing for repeal or modification of the 1988 Federal Gun Control Act. Typical of the attitude of a growing number of congressmen and senators is that a Senator William Proxmire of Wisconsin. Senator Proxmire, one of those who voted for the 1968 measure observes, "I would certainly vote the time of the senator proposal new After more observes, "I would certain for its repeal new. After more than a year and a half of experience with this bill, I have become convinced that it is not a practical retime measure. I would a state of the process of the

most emphatically support replacement of the act with some more practical and workable anti-crime asure with emphasis on punishing those who misuse firearms more severely, especially when more severely, especially w they engage in criminal action

A survey of congressional members shows that more than a third of the Senate and a quarter of the House, were by late 1970 on record in some way as favoring relaxation of the federal gun law. Correction of this piece of legislative folly take time.

In any event, it is an illustration of how easily our liberties can be infringed upon and how difficult_it is to retrace the path toward free dom.

And in this case, we can truth-fully say: "we told you so" as this has been our opinion and stand right along!
