

School Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School was called to order Monday evening, January 11, by the President, Francis Horn. Mr. Kessler and the following Board members were present: Mr. Horan, Mr. Stephens, Mr. Tuttle, Dr. Walker and Mrs. Slade.

The minutes of the previous regular meeting were read for approval. Motion to approve these minutes was made by Mr. Stephens and seconded by Mr. Tuttle. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Payrolls amounting to \$43,648.22 were read for approval. Motion to approve these was made by Mr. Tuttle. Seconded by Dr. Walker and carried by 5 votes of yes.

Mr. Kessler read the bills for the month of December amounting to \$8,675.41 plus gas. Mrs. Slade made the motion that these be paid. Mr. Stephens seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Cafeteria bills in the amount of \$1,215.07 were read. Mr. Tuttle made the motion that these be paid. Mrs. Slade seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

The Treasurer's report was read for approval. Mr. Stephens made the motion that the report be accepted as read. Mr. Tuttle seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

The Cafeteria report was read by Mr. Kessler showing a net loss of \$884.65 for the month of December. A motion was made by Dr. Walker to file this report with the minutes. Seconded by Mrs. Slade. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Interest only is due on Bus No. 24 on February 9, 1971. Mr. Tuttle made the motion that this be paid in the amount of \$13.49. Mr. Stephens seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Resolution to reduce School Taxes for certain persons filing claim for 1/2 exemption was read by Mr. Kessler. Mr. Tuttle moved Mrs. Slade seconded. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Mr. Kessler read the following Article of Recognition regarding Teacher negotiations.

Article I — Recognition
The Andover Central School Board of Education, having determined that the Andover Central School Teachers Association is supported by a majority of the teachers in a unit composed of all professional, certificated personnel except the Chief Executive Officer hereby recognizes the Andover Central School Teachers Association as the exclusive negotiating agent for the teachers in such unit. Such recognition shall extend until one hundred and twenty days prior to the annual meeting date in 1972 and for successive periods of one year thereafter.

The Board agrees not to negotiate with any other teacher organization other than the Association for the duration of this Agreement.

The motion was made by Mrs. Slade to accept this Recognition

Letter from Lois Boyer was read expressing her appreciation to the Board for being able to attend the recent Music Conference. She also commented on her favorable impression of the conference.

A similar note was received from Sharon Lewis who was a

member of the State Choir.

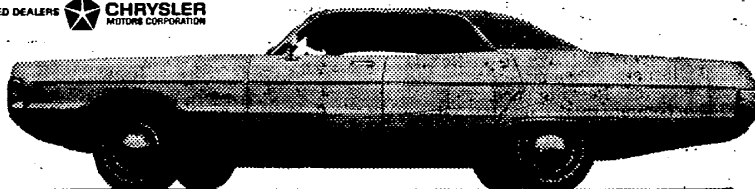
