Legal Notice

Local Law No. 4 of 1971 A LOCAL LAW TO PROVIDE FOR A PARTIAL TAX EXEMPTION OF REAL PROPERTY OWNED BY CERTAIN PERSONS WITH LIMITED INCOME WHO ARE SIXTY-FIVE YEARS OF AGE OR OVER.

BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Legislators of the County of Allegany as follows:

SECTION 1. The purpose of this local law is to grant a partial exemption from taxation to the extent of fifty per centum of the assessed valuation of real property which is owned by certain persons with limited income who are sixty-five years of age or over meeting the requirements set forth in Section 467 of the Real Property Tax Law.

SECTION 2. Real property owned by one or more persons, each of whom is sixty-five years of age or over, or real property owned by husband and wife, one of whom is sixty-five years of age or over, shall be exempt from county taxes to the extent of fifty per centum of the assessed valuation, subject to the following conditions:

- a. The owner or all the owners must file a proper, executed application annually in the board of assessor's office of the town where the property is located on or before the town's taxable status date.
b. The income of the owner or the combined income of husband and wife where title is vested in either the husband or wife must not exceed three thousand dollars for the income tax year immediately preceding the date that the application is filed.

c. Title to the property must be vested in the owner, or if more than one, in all the owners for at least sixty consecutive months prior to the date that the application is filed, provided, however, that in the event of death of either a husband or wife in whose name title of the property shall have been vested at the time of death and then becomes vested solely in the survivor by virtue of devise by or descent from the deceased husband or wife, the time of ownership of the property by the deceased husband or wife will be deemed also a time of ownership by the survivor and such ownership will be deemed continuous for the purposes of computing such period of sixty consecutive months and provided further that where property of the owner or owners has been acquired to replace property formerly owned by such owner or owners and taken by eminent domain or other involuntary proceeding, except a tax sale, the period of ownership of the former property shall be combined with the period of ownership of the property for which application is made for exemption and such periods of ownership will be deemed consecutive for purposes of this local law.

d. The property must be used exclusively for residential purposes, be occupied in whole or in part by the owners, and constitute the legal residence of the owners.

SECTION 3. This local law shall take effect on the date it is filed in the office of the Secretary of State.

This law was filed in the Office of the Secretary of State on January 13, 1971.

Legal Notice

Local Law No. 3 of 1971 A LOCAL LAW INCREASING THE AMOUNT OF THE MUTUAL INSURANCE RESERVE TO \$250,000.00

BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Legislators of the County of Allegany as follows:

SECTION 1. Paragraph numbered "15" of Local Law No. 1 of 1956, "A Local Law in Relation to the Establishment of a Plan of Mutual Self-Insurance", as amended by Local Law No. 2 of 1962, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"15. A self-insurance reserve for the plan is hereby established. The maximum amount which shall be contributed to such reserve shall be \$250,000.00."

SECTION 2. This Local Law shall take effect upon the date it is filed in the Office of the Secretary of State.

ISOLATED EATING "Isolated eating" is the expression for a trend in America that is increasing by leaps and bounds. It means members of the family each having breakfast on their own - perhaps grabbing whatever is available. Or father picking up a sweet roll and coffee in a paper cup as he boards the commuter train. It can include kids frequenting vending machines at school for a snack instead of breakfast at home. It can mean mother having breakfast by herself after everyone else is off for the day. Evening Meals, Too But most of all I sense that even family evening meals increasingly are being foregone. Children may eat after school instead of after dinner. Mother's evening dinner may be dictated by the timing of something on television, or she may eat downtown, or she may eat when he finally gets home. To much is a whirl these days. On weekends, and sometimes on even then, do some things sit down together for a meal and, hopefully, for enjoyable family conversation. Should we fight "isolated eating?" I think every family should make sure it is kept to the minimum that necessity demands. The family, I think, is still our real hope for the kind of communication and decency in human relations that are so needed these days. And meals together are an important part of the family fabric. But we need not get too upset if traditional patterns of family eating are only partly modified. Kids can do home work and also enjoy some evening recreation if their dinner hour is not determined by the delayed arrival of working members of the family. Perhaps mother and father could even carry on a private conversation if they ate dinner together later on some nights. The important thing is that all members of the family eat sensibly and get the nourishment they need - the specific nutrients they need, not just any old calories. Teach Your Family And it goes without saying that the more members of your family eat, so to speak, on the fly, the more they had better know about how to eat. Everyone needs foods chosen from a wide variety of those available. This is the basis of the four food group plan - that everyday we need servings from the meat group, the milk group, fruits and vegetables, and breads and cereals. All meals, all snacks should come from these groups with added fats, oils and sweets for the flavor and satisfaction they offer, and as necessary for energy. Children especially should not be allowed to gorge on so-called fun foods.
