Assemblyman Frank Walkley Reports

Abany—The Legislature met for the 1st time this year in an atmosphere of expectation — expecting Governor Rockefeller to propose tax increases — expecting that efforts to gain a sharing of federal tax monies would be unproductive — expecting a most difficult time in considering the budget — and expecting, in spite of all this, that demands for services will increase. Part of our dilemma is related to

Part of our dilemma is related to the way in which the state monies are spent. Over 60c of every dollar is returned to local govern-ments. Part of this is spent under state mandates, such as social ser-vices, highway maintenance, and education, but, if we are realistic about it, only a little flexibility about it, only a little flexibility exists and changes in the mandates would not result in lower spending. With this in mind, reductions in state spending could well result in increased local taxes. Surely belt-tightening can and should be done. Every possible means should be used to assure all of us that the money we are spending is used efficiently and wisely. When all is said and done we will probably have to decide that not enough can be done to reduce spending

rates without reducing or eliminating programs. As one fiscal expert has said, we have 207 different proposals for doing this, 57 from the Senate and 150 from the Assembly. These figures represent the number of members in the Houses. Perhaps his comment was somewhat facetious, but it does illustrate the difficulty facing uswhen it comes to reaching 3 deciswhen it comes to reaching a decis-

The fiscal matters will take up a great deal of our time this year as usual. The big difference this year is that very few of us, either legislators, voters, or taxpayers will be well satisfied with the re-
