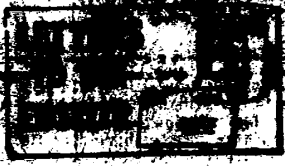

News That's Print To Fit

WEATHER MAKES HEADLINES AGAIN — The St. Patrick's storm yesterday and last night and that has continued thru most of today — will just bet that all of our "Snowbirds" that are sitting in the sun reading the papers in Florida are really smirking.

Here we are in the middle of Rogo's Week and all of the schools in Allegany County (in fact, most of them in Western New York) had to close. Bet all of the youngsters were mad about that!

Calling all Sportsmen! Calling all Sportsmen! Here is a News Release we just received today: A Public Hearing on the deer party permit system co-sponsored by the Joint Legislative Committee on Environmental Management and National Resources and the Assembly Standing Committee WILL BE HELD THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 4, 1971, at 10 a. m. in Chancellor's Hall at the State Education Building, Albany, N. Y.

Under present law, the Environmental Conservation Department is authorized to issue until December 31, 1971, special deer hunting party permits authorizing the taking of one deer of either sex by each hunting party, in addition to the one deer which may be taken by each licensed hunter.

In view of the coming expiration of the Environmental Conservation Department's authority to issue party permits, this is the appropriate time to gather testimony on the merits and demerits of the party permit system."

Assemblyman Glenn H. Harris, Chairman of the Joint Legislative Committee said in announcing the hearing.

"By holding a public hearing on the party permit system, the Joint Legislative Committee on Environmental Management and the Assembly Standing Committee on Conservation will be able to make an accurate assessment of the situation," Assemblyman Harris said.

So, if any of you readers have any names or addresses of people that have contacted you by phone about this magazine scheme, please let us know so that we can include them in our letter. After all, it's your \$\$\$ that we are trying to save for you — not ours!

"Your Amazing Mind" was the title of the film shown by Mrs. Janet Bliss, the School Nurse of the Andover Central School at a gathering of parents and teachers at their PTA meeting Thursday evening.

Mrs. Bliss outlined the new health program mandated by the State this year. The new curriculum which has been introduced in all grades K through 12 covers five phases.

The first phase — "Physical Health" covers their own personal nutrition, safety, sensory perception, disease prevention, etc.

The 2nd, the "Sociological aspect of health" covered smoking, alcoholism, drugs and venereal diseases.

The "Mental Health" section deals with family life regarding dating, sex, marriage and reproduction.

"Environmental" or community health which included conservation was the 4th phase and "Education for Survival" was 5th.

Mrs. Bliss informed the group of the many projects conducted in the various grades including papers and research on drugs prepared by the 8th graders and a panel discussion conducted by the Seniors.

Mrs. Bliss also pointed out that in educating the children regarding the use of drugs, medications, etc., it was hoped that the students themselves would decide which were to be used and which were to be avoided.

A question and answer period followed the program.

President Kay Shaw announced that the February meeting would be conducted by Mr. Forman and Mr. Peterson of the B.O.C.E.S. program. The Andover Boy Scouts were invited to present the Pledge of Allegiance at the opening of the February meeting.

Refreshments were served by the parents of the Fifth Grade Classes.

There will be a Question Box for anyone wishing to pose a question to be answered by the students of the High School Classes during the March meeting. Parents are asked to deposit their questions at the February meeting.
