TAKE NOTICE, that at a Regular Meeting of the board of trustees of the Village of Andover held on the 11th day of January, 1971, Glenn D. Thorp moved that

WHEREAS, in compliance with section 4-426 of the Village Law which states that no person shall be entitled to vote at any village election whose name does not appear on the register of the district in which he claims to be entitled to vote, now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that two inspectors of election be appointed to meet on the 27th day of February, 1971, at the Grange Hall in the Village of Andover between the hours of 12:00 noon and 2:00 P. M., to prepare a register of voters qualified to vote in the village election district for which they were appointed, by copying such names from the Village Register from the last preceding general election and covering all the area of the village election district of all persons qualified to vote at the forthcoming general village election, except the names of such voters as are known to have ceased to be voters in such district, and by adding thereto the names of all persons known to the names who will at the time of such election be qualified to vote thereat.

Print To Fit

Well, folks, maybe the "round dog DID KNOW what he was talking about last week.

We received our annual copy of the Buffalo Evening News Almanac this week and, lo and behold — it says that February is going to be a rough, tough, cold and snowy month. And it will continue to be cold the whole month. How does that grab you?

After Tuesday's storm dumped around 8 inches of snow on us and forested the closing of all area schools except Andover, Cuba, and Wellsville, then it had to go and get cold again, going down below zero last night.

Here are the recorded temperatures for the past week thru the courtesy of the "Boys Down at the Pump Station": Feb. 4th — L 4; H 21; 5th — L 21; H 42; 6th — L 11; H 35; 7th — L 4; H 24; 8th — L 2; H 33; 9th L 1; H 24; and the 10th — L 4, H 11.

We still haven't been able to come up with anything in writing as to what means can be taken in enforcing the Quarantine placed by the New York State Department of Health on dogs in Allegany County or what the penalty is. However, one of our readers did bring in the notice published by the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets that has been in effect in Allegany County for several years.

Here is the Notice: A NIGHT QUARANTINE for dogs is in force in this county. It was laid at the request of the county board of supervisors to help protect livestock from dog damage.

Dogs must be securely confined between sunset and one hour after sunrise. ANY PEACE OFFICER SHALL HAVE ON SIGHT ANY DOG AT LARGE IN VIOLATION OF SUCH ORDER. A Dog shall not be deemed to be at large if accompanied by and under full control of the owner.

Any owner of a dog who shall neglect to confine his dog shall be subject to a penalty of \$10.00.

Monday Holiday Plan Creates Mini-Vacations

The miniskirt may or may not be on the way out, but the mini-vacation will definitely be an "in thing" this year, says the New York State Department of Commerce. Mini-vacations are three-day week-ends brought about by moving four national holidays so that they always fall on a Monday.

As a result of a bill signed by Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller the following will be Monday holidays in New York State — Washington's Birthday, third Monday in February; Memorial Day, last Monday in May; Columbus Day, second Monday in October and Veterans Day, fourth Monday in October. The annual Monday holiday schedule will always be five since Labor Day is the first Monday in September.

The Monday Holiday Plan in New York State was a legislative proposal of the State Department of Commerce and had the endorsement of business, labor and travel vacation groups.

In those states celebrating Lincoln's Birthday — New York is one — the plan will get off to an extra long start. February 12 falls on a Friday making the first Monday holiday a four-day week-end. Independence Day is a three-day weekend this year. July 4 is a Sunday, but the holiday will be observed on Monday, July 5.

Know Facts On Snacks Tax

57th New York Senatorial District To pay or not to pay it, that is the sales tax question regarding certain "meals", according to State Senator Jess J. Present (R-Jamestown) who suggests that knowing the law may save many snacks and luncheon customers from paying unnecessary sales taxes on certain purchases.

A sandwich "to go" is considered a meal under the sales tax law. Senator Present said, and therefore persons ordering several sandwiches to take out, when each sandwich is less than one dollar in cost need not pay a sales tax on the combined total of the sandwiches should they aggregate more than one dollar.

On the other hand, a "bucket" or "barrel" of cooked chicken is considered a purchase of food in bulk and no sales tax is required according to information given the Senator by the state sales tax bureau.

A pizza, however, is considered a meal even though it may be destined to be cut into several snacks for a number of persons, he said and therefore is taxable if the cost is one dollar or more.

People dining together in a restaurant and getting a check which shows more than one person being served should know that when the charge for food and drink served to an individual totals less than one dollar it should not be taxed, even though combined, unless carbonated beverages or alcoholic drinks are included in the under one dollar amount, Senator Present stated.

Charges for carbonated beverages and alcoholic drinks are always subject to tax, he said. A beer paid for at the bar of a restaurant and a sandwich ordered and paid for separately at a table would be considered separately for tax purposes even though consumed together, according to Senator Present.

The state wants no one to pay more sales taxes than required under the law, and there are booklets available for the asking to clarify points of the sales tax law if you contact the New York State Sales Tax Bureau, State Campus Albany, N. Y. 12226, he said.

School Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School was called to order Monday evening, February 8 by the President, Mr. Horan. Mr. Kessler and the following Board Members were present: Mr. Horan, Dr. Walker, Mr. Stephens, Mr. Tuttle and Mrs. Slade.

The minutes of the Special meeting were read for approval. Motion to approve these minutes was made by Mr. Stephens and seconded by Mr. Tuttle. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

The minutes of the January 11 regular meeting were read for approval. Dr. Walker made the motion to accept these minutes and Alan Tuttle seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Mr. Kessler read the bills for the month of January 1971 amounting to \$9,552.47 plus gas and electric. Mrs. Slade made the motion that these be paid. Mr. Tuttle seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Cafeteria bills in the amount of \$1,534.41 were read. Mrs. Slade made the motion that these be paid. Mr. Stephens seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

The Treasurer's report was read for approval. Mr. Tuttle made the motion that the report be accepted as read. Mr. Stephens seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

The cafeteria report was read by Mr. Kessler showing a net loss of \$198.39 for the month of January. A motion was made by Dr. Walker to file this report with the minutes. Seconded by Mr. Tuttle. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Interest only is dug on Bus No. 25 on March 5, 1971 — \$45.83. Mrs. Slade made the motion that this be paid in the above amount. Mr. Stephens seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

The payrolls for the month were read for approval. Amount \$44,464.12. Mr. Tuttle made the motion that these be approved. Mrs. Slade seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

The bills due on Federal Grant Title II Basic — 1970-71 were read for approval. Mr. Tuttle made the motion that the bills amounting to \$303.58 be paid. Seconded by Dr. Walker. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Mrs. Slade moved that the resignation of Arthur McNeil — Spanish Teacher, be accepted. Alan Tuttle seconded the motion. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Mrs. Karen Copp was accepted as the new Spanish Teacher at a salary of \$6,700.00. Alan Tuttle moved that she be accepted. Mrs. Slade seconded — carried by 5 votes.

Alan Tuttle made the motion to accept the resignation of Mrs. Bowen effective June 30, 1971. Conner Stephens seconded. Carried by 5 votes.

The Board of Education approved the motion that the President, Mr. Horan allowed to borrow the sum of \$55,000.00 on a Revenue Anticipation note — pending the receipt of State Aid. Dr. Walker made the motion, Conner Stephens seconded. Passed by 5 yes votes.

The Board of Education accepts with regret the resignation of Geraldine Oakes Tax Collector. Mrs. Slade made the motion to accept this, Conner Stephens seconded. Carried by 5 yes votes.

Mrs. Slade made the motion that Mrs. Linda Brace be granted a leave of absence for one year for Maternity reasons. Conner Stephens seconded. Carried by 5 yes votes.

The Board has been receiving inquiries regarding the principalship opening. In the future the Board is planning additional meetings to discuss applications.

Mrs. Slade made the motion that the meeting be adjourned at 9:40 p. m. Mr. Tuttle seconded. Carried by 5 yes votes.
