Greenwood Central School News

The regular meeting of the Board of Education was held at the school February 8, 1971. Charles Smith, President, opened the meeting with Ronald Putnam, Walter Jackson, Stanley Holt and Charles A. Wright Sup. Principal, present.

The minutes of the last meeting were read. Ronald Putnam made the motion, seconded by Walter Jackson to approve the minutes as read and place on file. Carried.

The Treasurer's report was read with a balance of \$15,578.78 in the General Fund, \$1,616.14 in the

School Lunch Fund, \$1,359.99 in the Trust and Agency Fund and \$4,766.92 in the Federal Fund. Stanley Holt made the motion, seconded by Walter Jackson to accept the Treasurer's report and place on file. Carried.

Ronald Putnam made the motion, seconded by Stanley Holt to approve payment of claims 369-420 in the General Fund for \$3,557.86. claims 75-83 in the School Lunch Fund for \$1,491.80 and claim No 47 in the Federal Fund for \$84.14. Carried.

Mrs. Virginia York was present to present some facts on reading test results that had been given to the first graders. These showed that the students had done better this year divided in two groups than they had done in previous years in one group. She then left the meeting.

BOCES construction costs were discussed briefly.

Reservations for two will be sent in for the Steuben County School Boards Association dinner meeting at Haverling Central School for Feb. 17, 1971.

Mr. Wright informed the Board that Kemp Plumbing and Heating Inc., has been contracted with for boiler repairs.

Ronald Putnam made a resolution, seconded by Walter Jackson asking the State Education to conduct a feasibility study concerning a possible merger of Greenwood, Jasper and Troupsburg schools. Carried.

Mr. Wright informed the Board that the new bus has been delivered and has passed inspection.

The Board was presented a schedule of fees which the interscholastic sports officials want to change for the next three years, for officiating at games. Mr. Wright read a letter he had sent to Gov. Rockefeller, also a copy to Charles Henderson, asking for help in doing something about these high fees.

As a result of an incident that occurred Friday night at the ballgame, Mr. Wright informed the Board that beginning immediately any person who leaves the building during a school activity will not be allowed to re-enter the building.

Stanley Holt made the motion, seconded by Walter Jackson to advertise bus No. 18 for bids. The bids will be opened at the next Board Meeting, March 8.

NUTRITION AND YOUR TEETH
The newborn child's mouth contains the beginnings of 52 teeth. Since the unborn child depends upon its mother for nourishment, this means the pregnant woman's intake of calcium, phosphorus, and vitamin D, particularly, is of special importance. Without sufficient nutrition in the mother, her baby's start on tooth development may be impaired - or perhaps the baby will override her needs, causing the mother herself to lose valuable stores of calcium and phosphorus.
However you look at it, the facts emphasize, again, the importance of good nutrition for mother and baby - not just while pregnant, but before, during and after.
Although teeth do not appear in an infant's mouth until about the sixth month of life, the embryonic structures for them were formed before birth.
Teeth are living structures, even though portions of them are not. Dentine and enamel are inert. But the pulp of teeth contains nerves and blood vessels. Teeth are fastened to bones by a membrane which is a living structure. So are the bony ridges of the upper and lower jaw in which the teeth are imbedded.
Thus the integrity of these as- pects of dental health depends, too, on good nutrition.
Again, it must be emphasized that calcium and phosphorus are essential for dental health. And vitamin D must accompany these minerals in your diet if you are to effectively absorb and utilize them in your body.
Milk and Vitamin D
This is why milk - the source of about 75% of the calcium in our food supply (and an admirable amount of phosphorus as well) is so often fortified with vitamin D.
And what about older persons? Well, it is too often forgotten, or overlooked, that adults also need these same nutrients for the preservation of their teeth and supporting structures. Dentists find that periodontal disease is prevalent. Loosening of the teeth, and the loss of teeth from this cause, are related to deterioration of the membrane that attaches the tooth to its socket. Also to the loss of bone in the jawbone.
Along with all the other reasons why adults should consume two glasses of milk a day (including the maintenance of strong bones in the body, good heart action and a healthy nerve system), milk is essential as part of the good nutrition necessary for dental health.

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
