Purple And White

On the strength of two big league wins in their last two home games the Panthers have become the spoilers in the "C" League. The much improved Panthers snared their first league win February 19 at the expense of Alfred-Almond. The inspired A.C.S. cagers took the lead early in the second quarter and by halftime led 38 - 28. In the third quarter some of our best shooting and rebounding of the year put our lead up to 14. At 5:52 of the fourth, A.C.S. held a commanding 16 point bulge.

Bolivar opened in a man for man defense. This was just what Andover's scoring ace Mike Jackson had been waiting for. In a fine individual effort he canned all 11 Andover points in the deadlocked first quarter. Bolivar adjusted the defense in the second quarter, but the other Panthers were not to be denied. Only one point separated the teams at halftime: it was 24 - 23 in favor of Bolivar.

The Panthers took a 4 point lead late in the fourth quarter after trailing by a basket for most of the third quarter. With under a minute to go the battling Bulldogs twice came within two points of the surging Panthers. In both instances clutch baskets by Gregg Shellman pulled Andover out of trouble. It was a tough battle all the way, but the Panthers earned their second league win 55 - 51.

Mike Jackson led the Panther scoring with 29 followed by Gregg Shellman with 12. 7 of those in the final quarter.

With all their starters back the J.V.'s collected their 13th win of the season 64 - 55. The leading four J. V. players scored in double figures. Bob Jackson 18, Ed Wilson and Brian Cannon had 13 apiece and Fred Baker, 10.

The "C" League closes Tuesday, March 2 with League leading Fillmore (5-2) at fourth place Cuba (4 - 3) with the second place being decided between Bolivar and Alfred-Almond, both 4 - 3. Andover trails at 2 - 6.
