Albany — Two public hearings were held last week by the Commission on Eminent Domain. One was in Cobleskill and one in Albany. Interest was strong in Cobleskill because of recent land acquisition by the New York Power Authority. We have had clear demonstrations that the procedures need improvement. It is our intent to attack first the problems of procedures involved in taking real estate. Later we will considers substantice changes in the laws. One likely outcome of our work

er substantice changes in the laws.
One likely outcome of our work is a law on uniform procedures so that all Agencies with the power of eminent domain, whether it be the State, a unit of local government an Authority, or Utility, will follow the same processes.
The latest meeting of the Committee on Agriculture, in the Assembly, saw several representatives of the Food Processors in New York State as guests. 
The Ways and Means Committee continues to hold budget hearings The outcome will provide us with much useful information on that
