**Greenwood Central School News**

The regular Greenwood Central School Board of Education meeting Bus No. 18 was sold to the First Church of the Open Bible, Olean, New York.

Mrs. Virgil Streeter, third grade teacher, resignation, due to retirement, was accepted with regret, effective the last of June. Mrs. June Rollins, Instrumental Music teacher of the Greenwood Central School, was hired to fill this vacancy for the 1971-72 school year.

The next Board meeting was changed to April 5, due to spring vacation.

Mr Wright stressed to the Board members the importance of attending the meetings in Albany, April 19 and 20, regarding the feasibility study.

The Board passed a resolution to participate in the cooperative bidding for bread and bread products for the school year 1971-72 with other school districts in the Southern Tier.

Ronald Putnam and Walter Jackson will have a report for the next meeting regarding tax reduction for the elderly.

Mr. Wright recommended a "Golden Age" pass for the senior citizens to allow them to attend school sponsored activities without cost. The Board approved this recommendation for a person 65 years of age and older.

The Board was informed of the increase in fire insurance rates. They decided to add 10% increase in the coverage.

There was no action taken on the possibility of increasing the Ag program to a full day next year.

Ronald Putnam made a report on the Feb. meeting of the Steuben Co. School Boards Association at Averling.

A letter was read from Paddock Pool regarding the leak in the swimming pool. The repair of this will be considered in next year's budget.

The Board authorized Mr. Wright to sell a Simplicity tractor that is not being used.

The Board agreed to have an Employees' Recognition Dinner the same as last year.

Some items that were in non-conformance in the New York State Fire Inspection report will be included in next year's budget.

**Assemblyman Frank Walkley Reports**

Albany — Two public hearings were held last week by the Commission on Eminent Domain. One was in Cobleskill and one in Albany. Interest was strong in Cobleskill because of recent land acquisition by the New York Power Authority. We have had clear demonstrations that the procedures need improvement. It is our intent to attack first the problems of procedures involved in taking real estate. Later we will consider substantive changes in the laws.

One likely outcome of our work is a law on uniform procedures so that all Agencies with the power of eminent domain, whether it be the State, a unit of local government, an Authority, or Utility, will follow the same processes.

The latest meeting of the Committee on Agriculture, in the Assembly, saw several representatives of the Food Processors in New York State as guests. New York State is first in the United States in production of applesauce, apple juice, wax beans, sauerkraut, grape juice, baby foods, frozen apple slices, carrots, beets, preserves and jellies and second in canned apple slices, frozen cherries, green beans, pumpkin and squash.

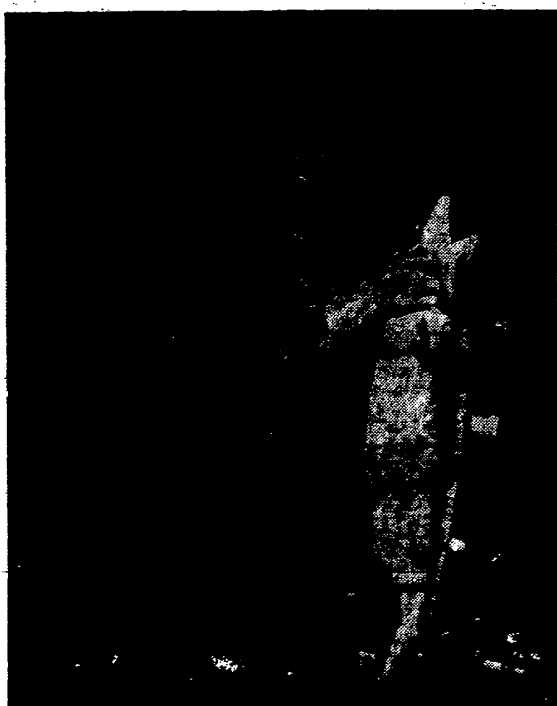
