Every night in the newspapers or flashed across our television sets or flashed across our television sets we hear and see student dissatisfaction in action. Sometimes it takes the form of debates, other times it takes the form of peaceful demonstrations and often the form of riots. We shake our heads in disgust and switch to a variety show or turn the pages of the paper to the comics. Do we ever think what we could do?

This question "what can I do" was one of the focuses at the work-shop I attended on Student Unrest at Bergamo East. In trans answer this question one word kept reappearing — "scool".


