STUDENT UNREST

WHAT CAN WE DO ABOUT IT?

Every night in the newspapers or flashed across our television sets we hear and see student dissatisfaction in action. Sometimes it takes the form of debates, other times it takes the form of peaceful demonstrations and often the form of riots.

This question "what can I do" was one of the focuses at the workshop I attended on Student Unrest at Bergamo East. In trying to answer this question one word kept reappearing - "school".

When most students enter college they are faced with an entirely different world, a world of different cultures, different values and wider freedoms, that many just can't cope with.

A recurring statement at Bergamo was "high schools must be made more relevant to everyday life", and high schools can be made more relevant with a little bit of change. One of the most highly recommended changes was to involve students in the policy making of the school.

do away with filling out passes, and encourage independent study. Most agreed restrictions in behavior and appearance should be kept to a minimum. Exchange student programs between rural and urban, and segregated and integrated schools were felt to be meaningful ways of finding out how others live.

A practical suggestion strongly upheld by the police force was to keep the school open at night and on week-ends as community centers. Supervision at these times could be taken over by student and adult volunteers or by hiring college students to supervise.

I believe what we are trying to say is that we want schools to be a part of our lives not an institution set apart. Dr. Fruse from Bowdoin University said it very well when he stated "schools have to adapt to rapid social change and

they haven't been as responsive as they could be. To make a school wholly undistruptive is to take away freedom".

Now ask yourself "Is there anything I can do?" "Is there anything Andover can do?"

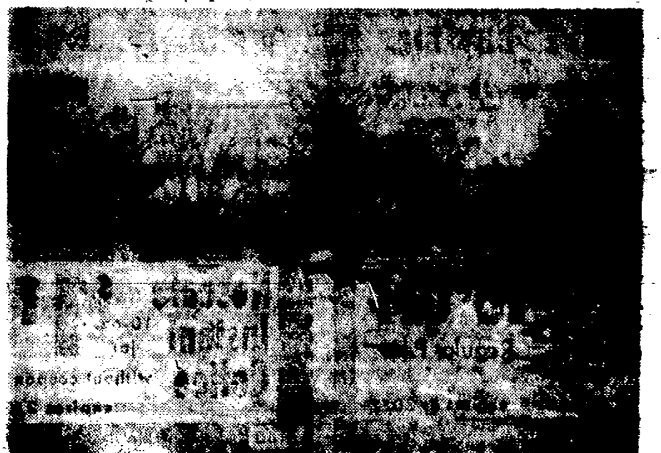
