Alcohol is the number one deadliest drug. While it is said that marijana is worse than alcohol. the effects of marijuana are still debated, while the effects of alcohol are apparent.

According to a conservative estimate by the National Council on Alcoholism (NCA), there are 6.5 million alcoholise in the United States. Some less conservative estimates say there are as many as 16 million alcoholics.

In the United States, death as a coult of alcoholism ranks behind

In the United States, death as a result of alcoholism ranks behind only heart disease and cancer. NCA figures show that there are 30.000 deaths per year as a result of cirrhosis of the liver, ruptured veins malnutrition and delirium tremens.

Suicides occur 58 times as often Suicides occur 58 times as often among alcoholics then among non-alcoholics. This figure doesn't take into account the 30,000 traffic accident deaths which result from drinking because a drunken driver is not necessarily an alcoholic

Drunkenness is the reason for more arrests than any other crime. In 1969, 1.3 million drunkenness arrests were made, while larceny

and theft ranked second with 470,000.

It wasn't until 1940 that people

It wasn't until 1940 that people began to realize that alcoholism was a disease and not a sign of loose morals.

Dr. Roger O. Egeberg, current assistant HEW secretary, describes alcoholism as "The No. 1 health problem of the nation."

We are now in danger of re-

We are now in danger of returning to our costly neglect of what has been called the most dangerous drug — alcohol.
