"Take Time To Give Time"

"Take Time to Give Time", was the theme of the twenty-sixth Annual New York State FHA Meeting. For three days over 500 FHA delegates, advisors and administrators followed the theme's emphasis on "taking time to share, plan, love and hope." Many people have asked me what we do at a State FHA meeting; therefore, I will try to list some of the highlights.

At our first general session Mr. Paparello, Principal of Suffern High School, delivered the key note speech entitled "Children of the Quake". He dramatically hit home the true meaning of sharing by giving examples of the actions of families during the recent California earthquake. Perhaps the phrase that remains more sharp than any other was when he was telling a true experience he had with a student. He said he had been riding a student heavily, because he knew the boy could do better and the boy turned on him and said, "Mr. Pap, why are you doing this? Why do you care as much about me? Why?" Mr. Paparello said that those words were good to hear. He said, "If someone asks you why you care so much, then you know you've accomplished something". Think on it people — it's true.

During the second general session the girls split into small groups labeled "Turn Ons". These were efforts to communicate our ideas to each other. What did we talk about? We discussed such topics as organized religion, abortion, the school system, the Vietnam War, drugs, pre-marital sex and the prevalent prejudice in our nation and the world. Reactions and opinions on these topics ranged from the very conservative to the very liberal.

At the banquet Thursday night, Leanne Cupp, the FHA National Vice President of the North Atlantic Region, spoke on prejudice. Apathy, she found, was one of the main causes for prejudice, be it racial, social, economical, or religious. People, she said, just didn't want to bother exerting the effort to understand each other. "Walk In My Shoes", a phrase from a popular song, points up the seeds of apathy and distrust. "If you'd walk in some one else's shoes", she said "perhaps you'd begin to understand what its all about."
