Greenwood Central School News

At the regular Board of Education meeting held at the Greenwood Central School, recently the following business was transacted.

Mrs. Sara Squires, Guidance Counselor reported on an opportunity for seniors to attend Corning Community College and earn credit hours. This would be up to the parents to pay for the credit hours as well as the transportation. The Board agreed to allow seniors to go to Corning Community College, during their senior year, and upon passing the college English and proficiency exam, they will be given one High School English credit. They will also be required to take enough Physical Education to satisfy the state requirement.

Several teachers had asked for personal leave April 9. It was the consensus of the Board that the Board Policy should be adhered to which does not allow usage of personal leave just prior to or just after a long week-end on a vacation.

Mr. Wright asked for volunteers for chaperones to a teen swim. Donald Putnam volunteered himself and his wife, one night a month. Lewis Dickerson of Jasper, has a senior lifesaving and water safety certificate and would be available as lifeguard.

Recommendations from C. Stanton Baltzel concerning items for building alterations that should be taken care of, was discussed. Some of these alterations will be taken care of this year, others when time and money are available.

Due to the cost of the BOCES Building Program being less than anticipated, methods of paying for it were discussed. There is an opportunity to either reduce payment each year for 5 years or to maintain our present level of paying with a reduced payment in the last year. The Board agreed to the last choice.

It was the Board's decision to furnish transportation, for any student that wants to go to summer school, at Wellsville, providing they pay their own tuition.

Thursday, May 20, was set for Employees' Recognition Dinner.

It was the Board's decision that in case of an emergency, an employee be allowed to make an ambulance or fire run without deduction from personal leave or pay.

School pictures were discussed. It was the Board's decision to stay with Rasbach another year and the expanded packet would be offered to the students.

A letter of resignation was read from Virginia Putnam, 6th grade teacher, effective the end of the school year. This was accepted.

Duane Coates was approved as substitute bus driver pending receipt of 3 letters of recommendation and the Superintendent's approval.

Nancy Bock was approved as an elementary teacher for next year.

Ronald Putnam made a report on tax exemption for the elderly, 65 years and older. He asked the Board members to examine the resolution he proposed and report back at the next meeting any recommendations they may have.
