

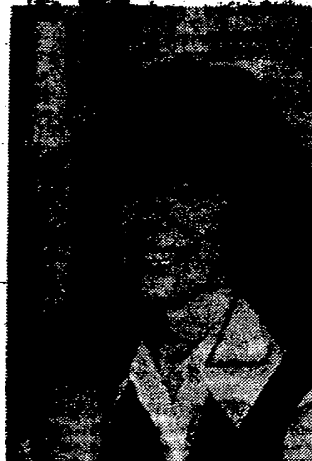

Canada-U.S. Goodwill Week
April 25 - May 1 marks the fifty-first observance of Canada-U.S. Goodwill Week. This observance was initiated in 1923 by Kiwanis International as a means to focus attention on over a century of understanding and peace which has existed between the two great countries.

The Rush-Bagot Agreement, a treaty of friendship, was signed on April 28, 1817. It resulted in the demilitarizing of the 3,000 miles of border between the two countries.

In 1923, President Warren G. Harding spoke at Stanley Park, Vancouver, British Columbia, he was the first American President to visit Canada while in office. The President spoke on the friendship which the two countries enjoyed. The Harding International Goodwill Memorial was erected to his memory at Stanley Park, two years after the President's death. This memorial was the inspiration for thirty-five peace markers built in later years.

Each peace marker bears this inscription: "This unfortified boundary line between the Dominion of Canada and the United States of America should quicken the remembrance of the more than a century old friendship between these countries - a lesson of peace to all nations."

Trial of a War

After reading the fine article on the Calley Case in the April 15, 1971 issue of The Andover News I would like to add my voice to those of thousands of indignant Americans. It is a shocking day in the history of the United States when one man is faced to bear the burden for our nation. Many people cry out how morally wrong the My Lai incident was, but then how morally right is any war? How morally right is the bombing of villages and cities filled with civilians? How morally right is it to convict one man for the crimes of all mankind.

Major General Samuel Koster had all charges against him of trying to cover up the massacre dropped. Why is he allowed to go free and not Lt. William Calley? Why does Lt. Calley face life imprisonment when the men with him at My Lai are allowed to live as free citizens? Many have said "but he killed innocent women and children." These "innocent" ones could just as easily murder our boys as any man.

Why should Lt. Calley be the sacrificial lamb when thousands of men have been trained and ordered to do the same thing? The military has convicted Lt. Calley for enacting a war it is waging. It must be terrifying for our men to be sent to fight for our country and wonder if, when they return, if they do if they may face the same fate.

Joseph Cappello summed it up when he said: "The war should never have been, then the massacre never would have occurred, and therefore the trial never would have been." I hope our people, our government, our President, will see Lt. Calley exonerated quickly, joyfully, and completely.
