Report On Rabies

Albany — The occurrence of rabies in wild & domestic animals has increased significantly in the past two years in New York State, principally in four northern counties. Dr. Hollis S. Ingraham, State health commissioner said.

In 1969, 500 animals in the State were found to be rabid, with Catskill, Franklin, Jefferson, and St. Lawrence Counties having the greatest incidence, Dr. Ingraham said. In 1969, there were 284 rabid animals, and in 1968 there were 41.

More than half of the diseased animals were foxes, 17 percent were domestic cattle and eight percent were skunks, Dr. Ingraham said. The remaining 45 cases were scattered among domestic and wild animals: five cats, 10 dogs, nine horses, one pig, three sheep, 12 bats, three raccoons, one bobcat, and one woodchuck.

Noting that there has not been a human case of rabies in the State since 1953, Dr. Ingraham warned that its presence in the animal population requires that adequate controls and precautions continue to be observed by health officials, physicians and veterinarians.

"Our rabies diagnostic laboratory facilities and the county rabies certification and animal vaccination programs are our principal weapons for attacking the rabies problem," he said.

The State Sanitary Code requires that bites by animals suspected of being rabid must be reported to the local health officer. In counties in

which the occurrence of rabies has been reported by the State Health Department, animal bites are reported to the local health officer.

The State Health Department is conducting a series of rabies control programs at the State University of New York at Cornell University, Ithaca, N. Y. but county health officers are also conducting similar programs.

Dr. Ingraham said that the State laboratory is now being expanded to receive specimens and reports are made within a few days.

Dr. Ingraham said that the State Department of Health is conducting a series of rabies control programs and he urged citizens to caution children not to molest pet animals, which may react to rough handling by biting. He added that parents should teach children that if a wild animal will allow itself to be touched, it shouldn't be touched. A healthy wild animal will flee at the approach of a human.

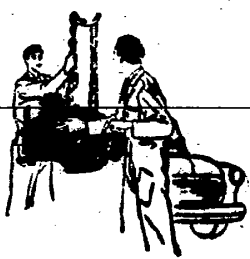
