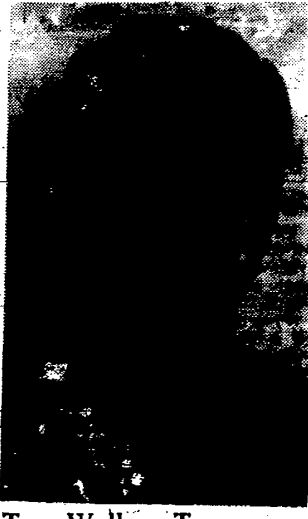

News That's Print To Fit

THE WILL OF THE PEOPLE... AGAIN BEEN SUBVERTED!! (rendered futile, void, inoperative, etc.) — This time, by the Town Supervisor and Board! — Without any Public Notice — Official or Unofficial News Releases — Warnings, or the like — the deadline of April 30th has passed by — and, according to the law that we are printing below — the Supervisor and Board can now appoint 1 assessor! Not three — just ONE! No voting! No chance to vote as in other Towns in the County! Just appoint one — and to Hell with the Taxpayers and Voters!

From what we understand, there were around 130 names of Taxpayers in the Town of Andover on petitions turned in to the Town Board at their meeting last Thursday night asking for the right for the voters to decide whether we choose to elect three Assessors — or have the Supervisor and Town Board appoint just one. We turned in one sheet with around 20 names that we collected in just a short time on Thursday — and everyone that we asked how they felt about the situation said that they were in favor of electing 3 Assessors — not just appointment of 1! When we asked them if they were willing to sign a petition to that effect — not ONE refused! And then — to have made this effort in vain — because the Public had not been notified of their prerogative!

Did the Supervisor and Town Board know about this new law? Well, we understand that the law as printed below was read to them several months ago, so the members attending the meeting heard it anyway.

Why then, were we not given the information at the News Office so that we could call it to the Taxpayers attention? Was it because the job had already been promised to a local Politician?

Now we are told that the Town Board is accepting applications from qualified persons for the job of Assessor — but this wasn't made public until after the meeting last Thursday — and that was 15 days after the deadline! This is one thing that the Voters should remember at the next Election, and we imagine more than a few will.

Here is the law as presented to us by the Attorney for the Town of Andover:

§ 1556. REAL PROPERTY TAX LAW

Title 5 — Application of Article: Adoption of Local Laws

§ 1556. Option to retain elective assessors

In any city or town where on the effective date of this section one or more of the offices of assessors is elective, the legislative body of such city or town, not later than April thirtieth, nineteen hundred seventy-one, may adopt a local law subject to a mandatory referendum, that the office or offices of assessors, as the case may be, shall continue to be elective as provided by the law in effect immediately prior to the effective date of this section, provided however, that such elected assessor or assessors shall in all other respects comply with the provisions of section fifteen hundred twenty-two of this article except that such assessor or assessors shall not be required to meet the minimum qualification standards established for such office or offices by the state board. Such local law shall be submitted for the approval of the electors at a special city or town election to be held at a time not later than July first, nineteen hundred seventy-one. Notice of the special election shall be held in the manner provided in sections twenty-three and twenty-five of the municipal home rule law. If the majority of the votes cast on the proposition submitted be in the affirmative, the office or offices of assessor shall continue to be an elective office in such local government.

is defined in section thirty-two of the municipal home rule law, nor local law shall be adopted which is inconsistent with the provisions of this article. No local law adopted pursuant to the provisions of the article shall be subject to a mandatory or permissive referendum except as provided in section fifteen hundred fifty-six. Added L. 1970, c. § 1, eff. Aug. 1, 1970.

Effective date of L. 1970, c. 957. § 1560. Inconsistent laws inapplicable

Provisions of all general, special local or other laws which are inconsistent with the provisions of this article shall be inapplicable to counties, cities and towns to which this article applies but if not inconsistent shall apply to such counties, cities and towns. Added L. 1970, c. § 1, eff. Aug. 1, 1970.

Effective date of L. 1970, c. 957. § 1562. Local governments to which article applies

a. This article shall apply to all counties except counties wholly within a city and all cities and towns in the state except (1) a city with a population of five million or more, (2) a city or town in a county having the power to assess property for purposes of taxation.
