Steve Hunt and Tom York drove to Jacksonville, Ill., last week to bring Terry Hunt home. Terry has completed two years at McMurray College.

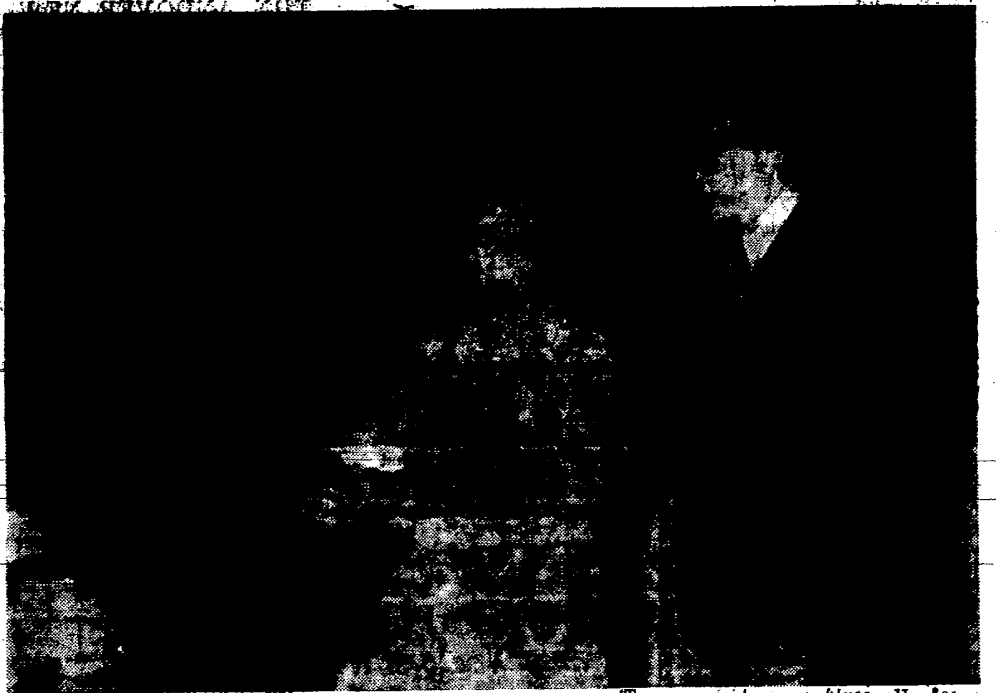

Mrs. Virgil Streeter will retire in June following 26 years of teaching. She is now a Third Grade teacher.

James F. Hastings Reports

The White House has informed Rep. James F. Hastings (38th Dist-NY) that it intends to increase funds for sewer construction in rural areas in fiscal 1972 which begins in July.

The Allegheny Republican last month had requested President Nixon to release additional grant

and loan funds administered by the Farmers Home Administration, citing a "massive" backlog of applications from rural communities faced with upgrading water and sewer systems.

Most of the increased spending was spelled out by President Nixon in a "Salute to Agriculture" radio speech on May 2 and calls for an additional \$100 million in loan funds for fiscal 1971 plus an additional \$111 million in fiscal 1972 for financing rural sewer improvement.

White House Presidential Assistant William E. Timmons told Congressman Hastings that "total financing including loans and grants, will total \$342 million in 1972, compared with only \$193 million in FY 1969."

In addition, he said, President Nixon is proposing a \$28 million increase for construction and a \$15 million increase for loans for the federal watershed protection program plus a \$12 million hike in funding for soil conservation district.

Mr. Timmons said he was certain Congressman Hastings would agree "that this Administration is making effort to improve the environmental aspects of rural America in addition to insuring a sound and prosperous agricultural industry as keystones for rural development."

Rep. Hastings had requested the additional funds to help communities with populations of 5,500 or less, many of which, he said, face serious financial problems because they lack federal assistance to build needed sewage treatment systems.

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
