MEMORIAL DAY

What does Memorial Day mean to you? It may mean a one-day vacation from school or a trip to the cemetery to place flowers on the graves of loved ones; perhaps it means you will march in a parade to honor the Servicemen who have given their lives for our Country or maybe Memorial Day has no meaning for you, no significance - just another day.

Whatever Memorial Day means to you I'll bet that you never questioned the holiday. You simply did what the custom in your family dictated and that was that. Why? Because that was what was expected of you. But, why? What make Memorial Day so different from other holidays we celebrate? Memorial Day originated during the Civil War when some Southern women decorated the graves of Soldiers on May 30. The women decorated the graves of both the Union and Confederate armies. It is believed that Cassandra Oliver Moncure from Virginia was largely responsible. She was of French origin and may have chosen this date because in France May 30 was "The Day of the Ashes." (This French memorial day commemorated the return of Napoleon's remains to France from St. Helena.)

May 30 was named as a special day for honoring the graves of Union Soldiers in 1868 by Major General John A. Logan. Logan was commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic an organization of Union veterans of the Civil War. They had charge of Memorial Day celebrations in the Northern States until the end of World War I, when the American Legion assumed this duty.

The Northern States celebrate May 30 as Memorial Day. The Southern States have their own days for honoring the dead. Many celebrate April 26 or May 10 as Confederate Memorial Day and others observe June 3, which is the birthday of Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederacy.

Memorial Day or Decoration Day is also known as Poppy Day. Servicemen sell small, red, artificial poppies to help disabled veterans. In recent years the custom has grown in most families to decorate the graves of loved one on this day.

Memorial Day is a patriotic holiday. It is a day to honor American Servicemen who gave their lives for a country they loved. That country is you. You are what these men gave their lives for. And so no matter how you celebrate May 30, couldn't you say a prayer of your own for these men who have died and are dying for you, for your Country, for Peace?

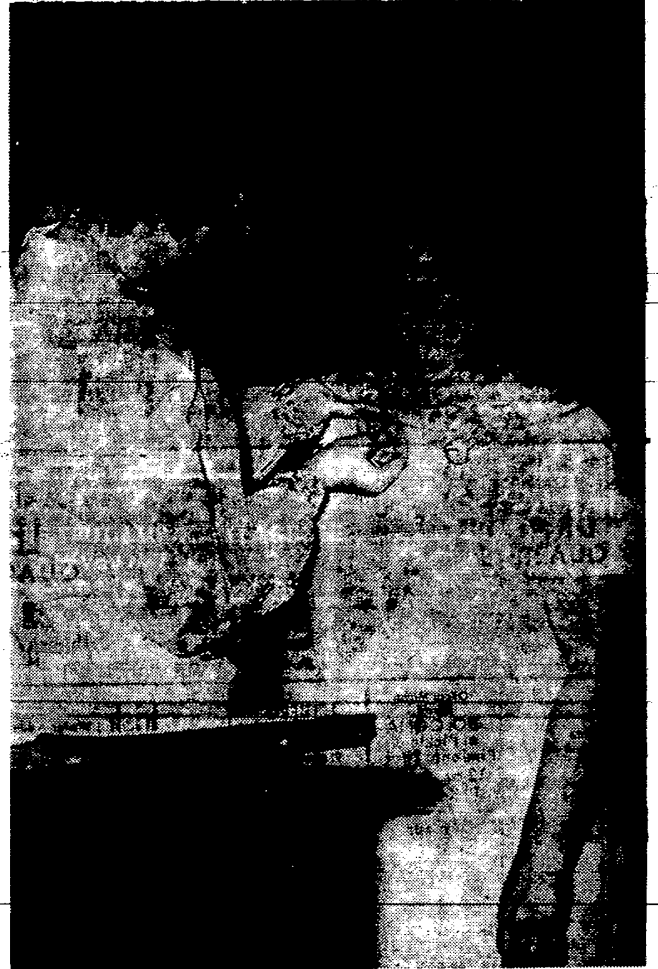
