## Sports Banquet Huge Success

Edson "Ike" Kincaid, Director of Athletics, Cuba Central School, was the featured speaker at the Annual Andover Sports Banquet held Wednesday, June 7th at the A.C.S. Cafeteria.

"Ike", who has been with the Cuba Athletic Department for 37 years and is retiring this year, gave a very refreshing talk on the theme, "It's not what ability you have — it's making the most with what you have."

Coach Kincaid, who played sports at the University of Rochester and at Ithaca where he graduated in '34 stated: "that if he had his life to live over, he would do exactly what he has for the last 37 years — spend it with young men in athletic programs". He also said that: "The school that has an active and successful sports program — has the least discipline problem, for the boys learn sportsmanship, discipline and team-work."

Here in Andover, 60 out of 80 boys in Andover Central School won 1 letter or more this past year in some type of sports with the awards being presented following the banquet. A list of all of the award winners appears on page 6.

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Andover was held in the Village Office June 8, 1971. Those present James Kessler, Mayor; William Dunham, Elmo Barden, Glenn Thorp, and Robert Baker, Trustees; Village Attorney Reginald Sootheran and Robert Costello.

Moved by William Dunham, seconded by Elmo Barden to accept the minutes of the special meeting held May 26th as read. Carried.

Moved by Elmo Barden, seconded by Glenn Thorp to increase the contribution to the Library from 1.100 to 1.300. This is the amount in the budget for the Library and for heat for the planning board room which is no longer in use. Carried.

Moved by William Dunham, seconded by Robert Baker to pay the annual dues of \$150.00 to the Municipal Electric Utilities Association. Carried.

Moved by William Dunham, seconded by Glenn Thorp to grant a trailer permit to Ben Gordon of Scottsburg, New York, subject to approval of sanitary facilities which can be chemical. Mr. Gordon is to supply a drawing of the land and the position of the trailer. The fee of \$5.00 is to be paid plus the taxes. This permit is to be reviewed after one year. Carried.

## Rev. E. E. Elliott To Speak At ACS Commencement

The Reverend Edward Everett Elliott III, Rector of Christ Church in Pittsford, New York will be the guest speaker for the graduation exercises on June 28. The title of his address will be "Letting Your-

self assume the work in this Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Rochester, he had been Rector of the St. Phillip-in-the-Fields, Oreland, Pennsylvania for fourteen years. There he served a congregation of 1,200 persons, becoming especially active with the youth in the community.

The Rev. Mr. Elliott was a pioneer in giving the teenage population a "place to be", with the help of his church vestry he took over an ex-laundromat cleaned it up called it "the tub" and opened it for a week to the youth. The project proved to be very successful, cutting the juvenile problem by three-fourths through the

summer. Today the tub is still helping. There is now a paid director and staff, and a good program.

He is a "late bloomer" in the Episcopal Ministry. Before his ordination in 1955 he served three years in the Army during World War II. He was a Sergeant-Major aboard an Army Transport and traveled some 250,000 miles through the South Pacific. Following the service he worked five years in the manufacturing field, entering college at age 30.

He graduated from Germantown High School in 1940; from West Liberty College in 1953 with a Bachelor of Arts degree and Honors, and from the Philadelphia Divinity School in 1957.

He completed his graduate work at the University and St. Joseph's College.

The Reverend Mr. Elliott and his wife, Betts now have an "older" and a "younger" family. The sons that were small when he entered college, are now in their 20's, both are in the service of their country. The younger three children are adopted and make the family complete.
