At a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Andover, held in the Village Office, Andover, N. Y., on Thursday evening, June 10th, 1971, after a public hearing held as required by Law, of which due notice was published in the Andover News, the following ordinance was adopted to control public peace and good order within the Village of Andover, Allegany County, N. Y.

It is ordained and adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Andover as follows:

The following is a copy of the proposed ordinance on public peace and good order of the Village of Andover:

Section 1. No person or persons shall be in an intoxicated condition or drunk upon or in any street, public places, or any public building in the village, or participate in any riotous and tumultuous assemblages in any street or public place in the village, or unnecessarily assemble upon the streets or in the doorways or stairways adjacent thereto, or loiter about such places in the village, or be guilty of any disorderly, riotous or tumultuous conduct within the village and thereby disturbing the peace and quiet of the village or any meeting or assemblage therein.

Section 2. A penalty of not less than five dollars (\$5.00) nor exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100.00) is hereby prescribed for each violation of this ordinance, and such violation shall constitute disorderly conduct and the person violating the same shall be a disorderly person.

Y., on Thursday evening, June 10th, 1971, after a public hearing held as required by Law, of which due notice was published in the Andover News, the following ordinance was adopted to control fast driving within the Village of Andover, Allegany County, N. Y. It is ordained and adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Andover as follows:

The following is a copy of the proposed ordinance on fast driving of the Village of Andover:

Section 1. No person shall ride or drive any animal in an immoderate manner, nor have any horse untied or hitched an unreasonable time in the streets or public grounds, nor drive any animal on any sidewalk therein, nor operate any motor vehicle on any public highway in a reckless manner.

Reckless driving for the purpose of this and the ensuing section shall include driving or using any motor vehicle or motorcycle or any appliance or accessory thereof in a manner which unnecessarily interferes with free and proper use of the streets of the village or unnecessarily endangers users of such streets.

Section 2. A penalty of not less than five dollars (\$5.00) nor exceeding fifty dollars (\$50.00) is hereby pres-

cribed for each violation of this ordinance, and such violation shall constitute disorderly conduct and the person violating the same shall be a disorderly person.

Section 1.

No person shall incumber any street, sidewalk or public ground with any material, nor have thereon any horse, team, automobile, truck or other vehicle so as to

obstruct the passage in said street except as may be permitted by proper regulations fixed by the board of trustees.

Section 2.

Every owner of land adjacent to the street shall trim all trees in said street in front thereof so that no part of any branch thereof shall be less than fourteen feet from the ground.

Section 3.

No person or persons shall in any negligent, willful or malicious manner injure or destroy any shade tree in the streets or public grounds in the village.

Section 4.

A penalty of not less than five dollars (\$5.00) nor exceeding fifty dollars (\$50.00) is hereby prescribed for each violation of these ordinances, designated as sections 1 and 2, and such violation shall constitute disorderly conduct and the person violating the same shall be a disorderly person.
