Bass Fishermen Mercury Waring

New York legion of fresh water anglers were out in force for the opening of the season on black bass and muskellunge on June 19 this year and it marked the unofficial start of summer for many sports

anglers.

In general, size limits for legal fish are 10 inches for bass, whether smallmouth or largemouth, and 28 inches for muskles. There are local exceptions to these limits, so the wise angler will check the Hunting-Trapping-Fishing Guide available wherever licenses are sold.

Although bass and muskles are

wherever licenses are sold.

Although bass and muskies are sought chiefly as sports fish, they can make fine table fare. This makes particularly significant the recent advisory by the Department of Environmental Conservation 'along with Health and Agriculture and Markets that in most instances anglers may eat their catches as often as once a week with no danger from mercury residues in the fish.

There are several important ex-

There are several important There are several important exceptions, most important of which is that pregnant women should rood eating any fresh water fish. Onondaga Lake is closed to all fishing and people ought not eat lake trout taken in Lake George nor muskellunge taken in the St. Lawrence River.

Aside from these, all fresh waterfish taken by sports anglers may
be eaten once a week.
Fish offered for sale, whether
from fresh or salt water, are inspected by the Department of Agriculture and Markets and, according to the earlier announcement
may be safely eaten in any quantity.
