

# Allegany County YMCA Offers Resident Camping

Through a cooperative program with the Olean and Jamestown YMCA's, the Allegany County YMCA is offering a summer resident camping program.

The major purpose of Camp Onyahsa is to develop a Christian personality in each camper and to prepare him for a life in a Christin society.

The Camp Director is a profes-

personality in each camper and to prepare him for a life in a Christain society.

The Camp Director is a professional YMCA staff member. Directors of the water front program and outpost camping are teachers or college stadents. Instructors are skilled bjecialists trained in their respective fields. Counselors are young men and women of 16 and 17 years of age, who are carefully chosen and trained at the YMCA. A registered nurse resides in Camp.

Facilities include 30 acres of land located in Dewittville, N. Y., with 1,000 feet of waterfront on Chautauqua Lake. Other facilities include a large main lodge, and dining hall, eraft shop, infirmary, archery range, cabins, tents, nature lodge, canoes, rowboats, war canoe, sailbar, two power-boats, and a real Chinese "Lunk".

Activities include instruction in swimming, canoeing, boating, nature lore, archery, athletics, crafts, camping skills, salling, water sking, power boat, and rifle.

The camp. Camp Onyahsa, on Chautauqua Lake, is owned and operated by the Jamestown YMCA. The resident camp is for boys and girls 7-16 years of age. The camp dates are as follows: 1st session, July 4-July 10; 3rd session, July 11-July 17; 4th session, July 25-July 31; 6th session August 1-August 7; 7th session August 1-August 7; 7th session August 15-August 14; and 8th session August 15-August 21.

The tuition per week at Camp Onyahsa is \$35 for Y members and \$40 for non-Y members. Call or write to the Allegany County YMCA for more information.


