Funeral services were held at the Koch Funeral Home, Ulysses, Pa. Saturday with Rev. Eldon Vanderhooff, officiating.

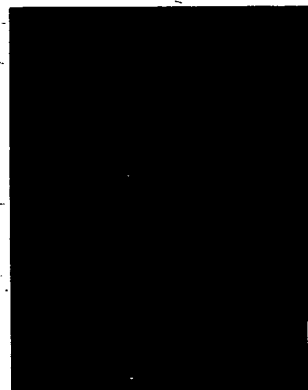
Burial was in Whitesville Rural Cemetery.

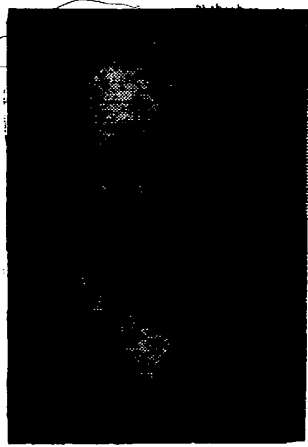

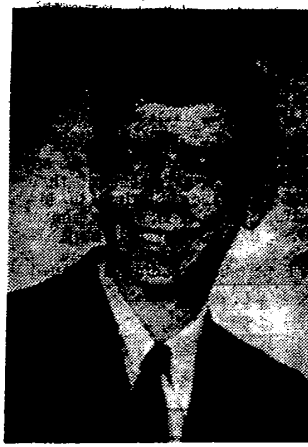

The Rev. Mr. Elliott, Rev. Clergy, Parents, Friends, and Teachers — Good Evening. How long, e. how short 13 years can be. I had a very difficult time searching for something worthy enough to share with all of you. Finally I realized I was searching in the wrong places. I had been searching for an issue—something shocking, something flashy, something controversial. Then I realized this was wrong, it wasn't sincere, it wasn't me.

Then someone very special introduced me to the writings of a very sincere and strong, yet idealistic man — Henry David Thoreau. Though he wrote a long time ago his beliefs apply to life today. He wrote "If a man does not keep pace with his companions perhaps it is because he hears the sound of a different drum. Let him step to the music which he hears no matter how measured or how far away." Think about that for a moment. Does not each of us hear a different drum? How many of us can not or do not want to keep pace? Is this to be condemned? Is this wrong? I do not believe so for I believe Henry David Thoreau is saving — Be an individual. Let others be their own individuals. Let it be me. Let it be you.

This is the message I give to all of you. Be an individual but don't be afraid of change. Believe in what you do. Believe in what you say. Above all Believe In Yourself. May God bless you all. Thank you.
