ANDOVER CENTRAL SCHOOL
Board of Education
August 9, 1971

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School was called to order by Mr. Conner Stephens, President. Mr. Weibezahl and the following Board members were present: Mr. Horan and Mrs. Slade.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read for approval. Motion to approve these minutes was made by Mrs. Slade and seconded by Mr. Horan. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Payrolls totaling \$9,119.32 were read for approval of the board. Francis Horan made the motion to approve these payrolls as read and Mrs. Slade seconded the motion. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

The Clerk's and Treasurer's reports were read. Francis Horan

made the motion to approve the reports and Mrs. K. Slade seconded the motion. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

The monthly bills for July totaling \$10,031.97 plus gas and electric were read by Mr. Weibezahl for the Board's approval. A motion to pay these bills was made by Mrs. K. Slade and seconded by Francis Horan. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

A motion was made to pay Principal of \$899.00 and interest of \$13.49 on Bus 24 due August 9, 1971 by Francis Horan, seconded by Mrs. K. Slade, carried by 3 votes of yes.

A motion was made to pay Principal due September 5, 1971 - \$1,527.60 and interest due \$45.83 on Bus 25 by Mrs. K. Slade, seconded by Francis Horan, carried by 3 votes of yes.

Milk Bid Received: Homogenized Vitamin D milk, butterfat content min. 3.5 percent; Glass, 1/2 pt., \$.07; Alternate bid - paper, 1/2 pt., \$.072. Elmhurst Dairy, Inc.; Richard Goodliff, Mgr.

Motion was made by Mrs. K. Slade to accept the bid of Elmhurst Dairy. Seconded by Francis Horan. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Ice Cream Bids Received: A motion was made by Francis Horan to accept the bid of Perry's Ice Cream Co., Inc. and seconded by Mrs. K. Slade. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Mrs. Slade made the motion that the transportation contract with Allegany County B.O.C.E.S. be extended for the academic 1971-72 year. Motion was seconded by Francis Horan. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Francis Horan made the motion that the Tax Collector Bond for \$5,000.00 be paid by Mr. Weibezahl. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Francis Horan made the motion that the YMCA be allowed to use the pool for the year 1971-72. Mrs. K. Slade seconded, carried by 3 votes of yes.

Geri Callahan has asked to use the school for dancing lessons. Motion was discussed and was tabled pending full membership of the Board being present.

Several motions were discussed with Mr. Weibezahl.

Change was made in Board Handbook - Page 13, Number 1, Paragraph C. School district Elections - should be changed from age 21 to age 18 for voting. Francis Horan made the motion and Mrs. K. Slade seconded, passed by 3 yes votes.

Francis Horan made the motion to adjourn. Mrs. K. Slade seconded. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Here we are located in a nice trailer park on the beach at Plover, Quebec, which is about 80 mi. southeast of Gaspe. We were at Gaspe last night and will stay here over the weekend.

Coming down the St. Lawrence from Montreal and Quebec, we got tired of driving along the river and seeing the French. The French have no regards for the solid line on your left and in fact the double line too.

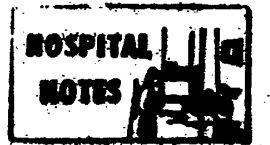
The last 150 miles before we got to Gaspe, it was real mountainous and sharp curves. When we left Florida, June 8th, we did not expect to make such a long trip.
