No fee will be charged for taxes during September. For the Month of October, the fee will be 2 %.

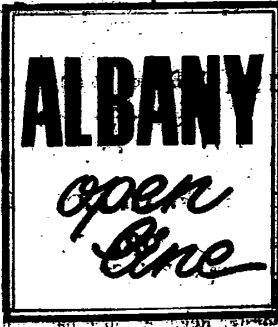

Upstate Democratic leaders will have a chance to see New York City Mayor John Lindsay up close this month.

Lindsay is travelling to Syracuse for a two-day meeting of the full State Democratic Committee on September 17 and 18.

Initial reaction to the Lindsay switch to the Democratic party could be said to range from hostility to apathy among upstate party leaders, meaning they want to see which way the wind is blowing before they make any moves. The first moistened finger will be extended into the atmosphere in Syracuse.

Assemblyman Edwyn Mason is all burned up because of misinformation about Albany interpretations of a new state sanitary code.

He said farmers had been informed that after September 3 they would have to transport their milk in van trucks

Actually said Mason, the new code only requires that a cover be thrown over the tops of the milk cans.

"Many, many farmers have been told by their processing plants that they must buy new, van-type trucks to comply with the ruling," said Mason, "Nothing could be further from the truth".

Assemblyman Donald Shoemaker's Joint Legislative Committee on Industrial and Labor Problems is going to get into a touchy area when it meets in Geneva on September 15.

### Sheriff Burdick Says: "He Stands On His Record"

Allegany County incumbent Sheriff Richard C. Burdick has pointed out improvements made in the county system and promised a steady increase of effectiveness in the years to come as he issued his statement of position this morning, prior to Tuesday's primary election. "I feel that the Sheriff's Department should compliment the various law enforcement authorities within the county rather than be a total force on its own," he said. "I believe this was most clearly brought out by my initiating the system of identification cards for young people which have proven to be such a help to liquor inspectors and those establishments selling legal beverages. When I assumed the post of Sheriff three years ago, I had two deputies. Today there are four deputies as well as relief men for days of 200 week-ends. The personnel I have added to the department all possess in-depth police training. The police with which these men work and the new spirit which has been placed in the department is perhaps best indicated by the fact that the deputies have purchased, at their own expense, official uniforms".

The Sheriff's Department does a limited amount of patrol work, designed to compliment that of local and state police. Sheriff Burdick pointed out in his annual report to the County Legislators. During the calendar year 1970 there were 268 male and nine female prisoners received at the county jail. The Sheriff said in his report that much

The committee is going to look into the right of agriculture workers to organize into unions for collective bargaining.

"Farm workers are the last remaining large group of workers who are not yet unionized," said Shoemaker, adding that "increasing pressure by labor organizations and the agriculture industry, indicate that some legislative action is necessary, either on the state or federal level".

Shoemaker said the committee has asked the New York School of Industrial and Labor Relations at Cornell University to make a study of the problem.

of the cost of caring for the prisoners is reduced by the inmates raising a garden from which a total of 543 quarts of fruit, vegetables and soups were canned or frozen. Despite the sharp increase of the price of basics, the average cost of feeding a prisoner for a day was held at \$1.34 the report continued.

"I firmly believe that while we are a small force we are flexible and can handle any department in emergencies. For example, I have made arrangements with a scuba diving club to help my department in the retrieval of evidence or in the recovery of bodies in lake tragedies. In addition to this the Sheriff's Department is most active in boating safety on lakes within the county. Some 400 motor craft were checked out for safety equipment last summer. Sheriff Burdick's innovations concerning water safety have earned him the chairmanship of the New York State Sheriff's Association's navigation committee.

As an officer of the court, Sheriff Burdick spent 127 days in County Court as well as 82 days in Family Court last year. The civil work handled by the department has nearly doubled in the last three years.

Sheriff Burdick joined the county department in 1950, was named Under Sheriff to E. Vanama Jones from 1957 until 1969 when Sheriff Jones stepped down. Mr. Burdick was elected sheriff and now seeks a second term. He is a lifelong resident of Friendship, has been a member of the volunteer fire department there for nearly 30 years and is a life member of the Allegany County Volunteer Firemen's Association. He was recently elected sergeant-at-arms in the State Sheriff's Association and is a member of the Wellsville Elks Club.

In conclusion of his statement Sheriff Burdick said, "I pledge continued good service to the people of Allegany County. Gradual improvements will be made at an absolute minimum of expense".
