## Missionary To Speak AT Andover Church

An evangelistic and educational missionary of the United Methodist Church, the Rev. Borje Alfred Persson, will speak at the Andover United Methodist Church at 7:30 p. m. this Sunday, October 3rd. His presentation will be preceded by a tureen dinner at 6:30 p. m. All are invited to both the dinner and the missionary talk.

A second-generation missionary, he is the son of the Rev. and Mrs. Josef A. Persson, Swedish-born missionary who served a number of years in Africa.

For the last year Mr. Persson has been principal of Union Seminary at Ricatia, Mozambique, and district superintendent of the Marques District in that country. When he entered missionary service in 1949 Mr. Persson headed the Methodist industrial school at Cambine. After serving there for eleven years he worked in Johannesburg, first as an adult educator and later as district superintendent. He has also headed Chicouque Station in Mozambique.

Mr. Persson was born in Chicouque and educated at the Jeppe High School in Johannesburg, the Transvaal, and at the University of Witwatersrand, Johannesburg. Before becoming a missionary he taught in the Transvaal for nine years.

Mrs. Persson (Dorothy) was born in Johannesburg. She shared some of the responsibilities on the mission field with her husband. In addition she has taught the pastors' wives Home Economics, that is Nutrition Hygiene, Anatomy, Cooking, and Sewing. Mr. and Mrs. Persson are the parents of two grown children Peter and Colin who have remained in Africa.

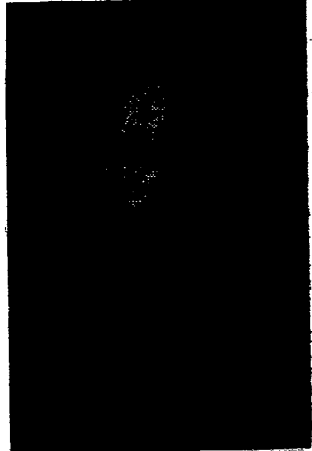

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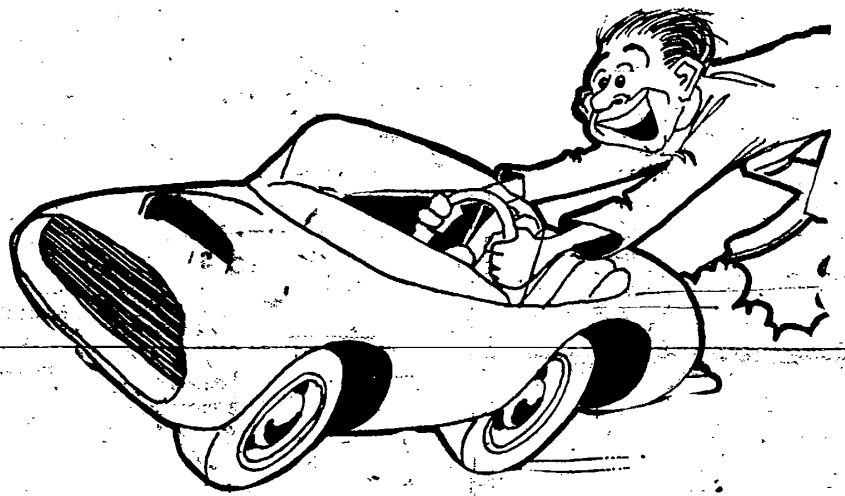
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
