Fire Chief Says Free Rescue Decals Still Available

Frank Cahill, Andover Fire Chief, reminds all local residents that there are still plenty of fire rescue decals available for children and invalid bedroom windows under the new "fire rescue plan" instituted last year during annual "Fire Prevention Week".

For all new comers and residents of Andover — the new fire rescue plan involves the distribution of reflecting decals which will be stuck onto the bedroom windows of invalids and children so that they can be easily identified from outside either day or night by local firemen in case of an emergency.

Fire Chief Cahill points out that fire may strike at — any time — and, — in any home — and no one can tell if — YOU or YOURS — may be the next victim!

According to statistics from the New York State Department of Health, fires killed 441 persons in New York State during 1970 — and — nearly half of those who died were either small children or elderly people.

Since the above mentioned children and elderly persons probably did not have the knowledge or the ability to react quickly to the danger of fire, the "Fire Rescue Plan" instituted by the Andover Fire Department is just that much more important to prevent the possible loss of life in these categories.

Any local residents who have not been contacted can have these decals placed on their bedroom windows free of charge by contacting Frank Cahill, Andover Fire Department Chief.

"Ye Hubbards' Cupboard" Store To Benefit Aging

Approval for immediate opening of the first "Ye Hubbards' Cupboard" store in the county, to benefit the aging, was approved for sponsorship thru Allegany County Senior Citizens Informational Center, Inc., by its Board of Directors at a meeting last Thursday evening.

Located at 20 Madison Street, Wellsville, N. Y. (on the corner adjacent to the parking lot across from Super Duper), the unique store will open this coming Monday, October 11, 10 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. A grand opening is to be scheduled later.

"Ye Hubbards' Cupboard" will provide an outlet for Allegany County made products, mainly Senior Citizens' and handicaps' arts and crafts, sold to give recognition to the incomes of the individual artisans. Other products made in Allegany County will be sought for sale, such as: cheese, maple products, baked goods, and other small sized manufactured items, etc.

Individuals, businesses and organizations donating any new, excellent quality small used items and/or antiques, accepted for sale at the store, will receive a tax exemption donation receipt for the fair market value of the items since this serves the intent of the non-profit sponsors.

Responsible for providing for and manning the store in the beginning will be the staff of the Informational Center and volunteers who offer to help. Incomes derived from store sales (after paying craftsmen and meeting utility and other minimum expenses), will be directed to part-time employment of the elderly in the store program, opening added stores in this county's communities and some aid to the Center's total county program for the elderly.

Obviously, to achieve this level of expanded aid and income for the aging, arts, crafts and donated items from all areas of the county.

In addition, plus the patronage of all who will support "Ye Hubbards' Cupboard" through purchases, said Robert G. Aldrich, Coordinator of the Informational Center.

Once-a-month merchandise pick-up points for contributors are being established in the county and will be advertised. However to hasten the benefits to be derived from immediate opening of "Ye Hubbards' Cupboard" craftsmen and donors from across Allegany County are urged to contact Informational Center, Inc., S. Brooklyn Avenue Wellsville, N. Y., or phone (716) 593-5460 at once. Information will be needed on where to pick-up what items and in the case of craftsmen, the variety and potential out-put of their craft. A list of selected items which can be relied upon for store stock and sale.

The Informational Center's sponsored Dollar Stretcher Plan and numerous other pioneered aids for the aging have been realistic enough to be copied in many other parts of the state and also other states. Your support of and participation in the new "Ye Hubbards' Cupboard" store, project, will bring even greater focus to Allegany County's real working concern for its elderly", Aldrich said.

60-Day Split Duck Season Announced

Good waterfowl hunting prospects were forecast for this fall with the announcement of season by Henry L. Diamond, Commissioner of Environmental Conservation. Upstate generally there will be a 60-day split duck season running from October through November 29 and from December 24 through January 2, 1972. Excluding the Lake Champlain area, this will mean the basic bag limits (with certain exceptions) are three daily and six in possession.

In the Lake Champlain area which takes the same season and dates as Vermont, dates are October 9 through November 27, a single season of 50 days during which basic limits are four per day and eight in possession.

Liberal bag limits continued from last year are in the form of bonus birds in addition to the basic bag in each upstate season. For the first nine days in either area upstate generally from October 1 - 9 and in Champlain October 9 - 17, two extra blue-winged teal may be taken per day, and four kept in possession. Scaup also are in excellent supply, and during the entire season in certain upstate waters generally two additional per day may be taken and four kept in possession. In Lake Champlain only from November 1 - 27 is this true; this is to prevent over-harvest of the similar appearing ring-necked duck which, although scarce, is most abundant during October.

Those birds still in somewhat precarious status and the objects of an effort to allow them to increase are again partially protected. Only one black duck may be taken per day (two in possession) during the 60-day season, and two per day (four in possession) during the 50-day Lake Champlain season. For both these seasons wood duck limits are also restricted to two and four, and canvasbacks or redheads are limited to one and one of either.

Goose and brant seasons upstate will begin at the same time as the duck season in each area and run 70 days until December 19 in upstate generally, and to December 17 on Lake Champlain. Three geese may be taken daily (six in possession); for brant the limits are six and 12.

For the third consecutive year, Long Island will enjoy a season entirely separate from those of upstate New York, New Jersey or Connecticut. Long Island will open its duck and 70-day geese and brant season on November 15. Regular duck season will wind up on January 3, but a special scaup-only season of 16 days will be held after that on tidal waters only.

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
